

Hazeltines donate \$1 million to USI

Donald R. and Allene Hazeltine, formerly of Evansville, have donated an unrestricted \$1 million gift annuity to USI. **President H. Ray Hoops** announced last week.

"We are grateful to Donald and Allene Hazeltine for this wonderful gift and are excited about the new opportunities it will create for the University and the students in the years ahead," Dr. Hoops said. "We salute the Hazeltines' vision in giving a gift which can be used where the needs are greatest."

The Hazeltines now reside in Sarasota, Florida. Their contribution is the first million-dollar gift by a member of the USI Foundation Board of Directors. Mr. Hazeltine served on the USI Foundation Board of Directors beginning in 1982; he was appointed to the Foundation Advisory Council in 1989.

"While working with the Foundation Board, we worked closely with David and Betty Rice, then president and first lady of USI," said Mr. Hazeltine. "I was impressed with the good they were doing with the money they had. Evansville has been good to us, so we thought giving the money to the University would be a good way to give back to the Evansville community."

In 1997, the Hazeltines contributed an endowed Presidential Scholarship during *Campaign USI*.

A native of Beloit, Wisconsin, Mr. Hazeltine retired in 1988 as president of Southern Indiana Operating Co., Inc., which owned and operated a McDonald's Hamburgers franchise in southern Indiana and central Kentucky. He and his wife moved to Evansville in 1959, and they moved to Florida in 1993.

In the mid-'80s Mrs. Hazeltine helped initiate a sorority system on campus through her work with Tri Sigma.

This is the sixth gift of one million dollars or more to USI. Other million dollar donors are Nick and Jo Carter in 1994, Nick Carter in 1996, Dallas Suhrheinrich in 1997, Robert and Elaine Pott Foundation in 1998, and Epi-Hab Evansville in 1999.

New Harmony's Murphy Auditorium

will be renovated to allow accessibility to all patrons

Renovations to Murphy Auditorium, the stage for New Harmony Theatre's summer season and the center for cultural programs in New Harmony, Indiana, are planned to bring the facility in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990 allowing accessibility to all patrons, with special consideration for disabled citizens. The renovation work is expected to begin in December and be completed for The New Harmony Theatre 2000 summer season that begins in June.

The renovations include a parking lot near the building, an exterior ramp leading into the building, additional lighting, a spacious seating area for those in wheelchairs, an interior ramp leading from the seating area to the lobby, and a handicapped-accessible restroom in the lobby.

Murphy Auditorium was built in 1914 for the New Harmony Centennial. Major renovations were made to the facility in 1975 before ADA compliance was an issue. "Keeping the historical integrity of the building and meeting the ADA requirements requires an architectural design that is sensitive to both areas," said **Dr. James Blevins**, dean of the School of Liberal Arts. "The renovations are planned to meet these needs," he said.

"New Harmony Theatre patrons have been requesting more access to the building," Blevins said. "Great care has been given to providing patrons an enjoyable experience with the least amount of inconvenience," he added. Blevins is also producer of The New Harmony Theatre.

Mr. Scott LaFeber, artistic director for The New Harmony Theatre, said, "We know the renovations will make the Murphy a splendid place to spend an evening of great theatre. We have a particularly fun and wonderful season planned to celebrate the new Murphy Auditorium."

The New Harmony Theatre 2000 season will open June 9 with the farcical comedy *Noises Off* by Michael Frayn. *The Philadelphia Story* will be offered in July followed by the musical *Always, Patsy Cline* in August.

Season tickets are now on sale for the season. Gift certificates for holiday giving and other occasions are on sale through the USI Theatre box office, 682-3115.

A \$175,000 grant from the Posey County Community Foundation supported by the Lilly Endowment will help fund the renovation project. Additional funding is available from the Blaffer Trust.

The renovations are being managed by USI staff engineers.

Tours of winters past

Historic New Harmony will hold the 1999 Candlelight Tours on Friday and Saturday, December 3 and 4. Interpreters portraying famous people from New Harmony's past will share their memories in "Seasons of Giving."

Tours will leave the Atheneum every half-hour beginning at 4 p.m. with the last tour departing at 7 p.m. Music and holiday treats will be offered as guests travel through winters past.

Many of New Harmony's historic sites will be decorated in Christmas finery. The winter stroll will include stops at the Workingmen's Institute, the newly opened David Dale Owen Laboratory and Granary, and the 1775 Double Log Cabin.

Cost for the tour is \$8 for adults, \$6 for children ages 7 - 17, and \$5 for Historic New Harmony Society members. Children under age seven are free. To order tickets or for more information, call 682-4488.
