HISTORIC FIRST MEETING OF BOARD OF INCORPORATORS HELD SATURDAY. The first meeting of the Board of Incorporators for an independent state university in southwestern Indiana was held Saturday, April 28 in the University Library. Governor Robert D. Orr presided at the swearing in and gave the charge to the Board. John J Pruis was appointed chairman by Governor Orr when the nine members of the Board were selected. At the Saturday meeting, Joseph O'Daniel was elected vice chairman, and Carolyn Georgette was chosen secretary. The Board will meet again Monday, May 7, in the University Library, Room 100.

<u>SPANISH DAY FIESTA ON CAMPUS MAY 4.</u> The third annual Spanish Day Fiesta will be held in the Physical Activities Center Friday, May 4 from 9:00 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.

More than 700 students enrolled in Spanish classes in area high schools will participate in numerous activities requiring use of that language. Featured are the "International Dancers," a group performing Spanish folk dances. Other highlights include a slide presentation on travels to Mexico and Spain, auctions spoken in Spanish, and use of computer programs written in Spanish. Prizes will be awarded throughout the day.
