TRAFFIC PATTERNS ALTERED FOR CONSTRUCTION OF NEW ENTRANCE

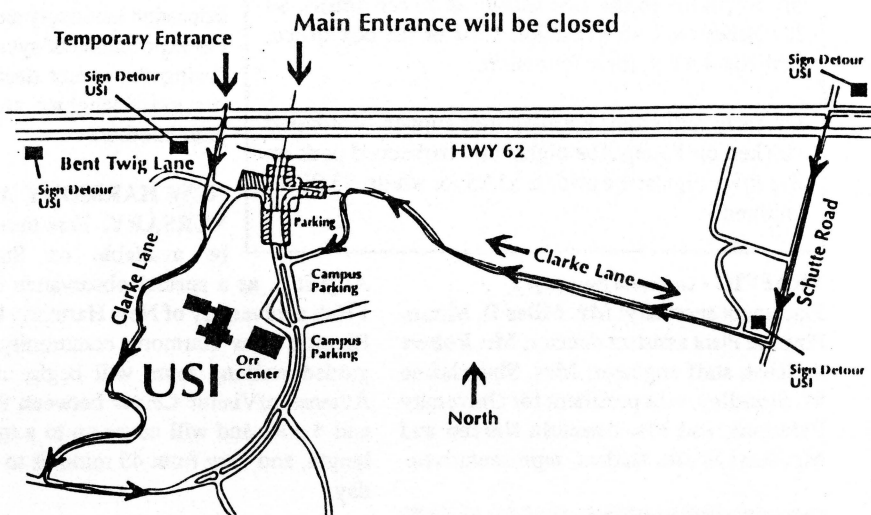
USI's main entrance will be closed on Monday, August 9, for the duration of construction of the new overpass entrance to the campus, according to Mr. Robert Mills, overpass project director with Bernardin Lochmueller consulting engineers.

Also, from approximately Monday, August 9, to Monday, August 30, the intersection of Clarke Lane and University Boulevard will be closed to traffic while it is rebuilt in conjunction with overpass construction.

Two temporary entrances from the highway will be available (see map at right).

Motorists coming from the east are asked to use the Schutte Road/Clarke Lane access to campus. This traffic will be routed through the parking lots to the boulevard during the August 9-30 reconstruction of the boulevard/Clarke Lane intersection.

Motorists coming from the west can enter the campus through a temporary entrance now under construction some 400 feet west of the present entrance. (The temporary entrance is on an alignment with Eickhoff Road, which will be closed because the new overpass will cut off access from Eickhoff to the highway.) Motorists using this temporary entrance may use a campus service road behind the Science Center, Physical Plant, and Technology Center to reach the boulevard during the August 9-30 period (see map).



It is hoped the boulevard/Clarke Lane intersection will be completed and open from both directions by the time fall classes start on August 30. The temporary entrances will remain in effect for the duration of

overpass construction, which is scheduled for completion by the start of Fall 1994 classes.

Everyone using the campus is advised to build in extra time and be prepared for delays and detours.

All detours will be posted.

Those living in campus housing may wish to walk or bike to classes to avoid the traffic.

This might be a good time to use mass transit since hourly bus service is available on Evansville's METS system.

NEW HARMONY ANNI-VERSARY. Free tours will be available on Sunday,

August 8, as a special observance of the 179th anniversary of New Harmony by the Historic New Harmony community. The guided walking tours will begin at The Athenaeum/Visitor Center between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. and will cover up to a mile in length, and vary from 45 minutes to a full day.

The Harmonie Society, German Lutheran separatists led by George Rapp, bought 30,000 acres of heavily forested land on the Wabash River in 1814. On August 8 that year, an unknown surveyor staked out the community that was the Harmonie home for ten years. It became the site of a second experiment in communal living when it was bought in 1824 by Welsh-born Robert Owen, then an industrialist in New Lanark, Scotland.
