CURRICULAR COMMITTEE REPORT

At its meeting of February 19, 1973 the Curricular Committee gave its initial evaluation to the following course petitions:

<u>COURSE NUMBER</u>	<u>TITLE AND DESCRIPTION</u>
Art 220A	<p><u>Crafts</u> - 3 Hours</p> <p>Basic experience with a variety of materials and tools. (e.g., wood, clay, metal, fiber). The manipulation of materials with respect to craftsmanship and art. The class meets for six (6) laboratory hours per week.</p>
Art 220B	<p><u>Crafts</u> - 3 Hours</p> <p>Continued experience in materials with emphasis on craftsmanship. The individual is encouraged to concentrate within a limited concept or media. The class meets for six (6) laboratory hours per week.</p>
Art 221A	<p><u>Design in Materials</u> - 3 Hours</p> <p>Three-dimensional designs emphasizing the use of space, time, and light in relation to functional design. Experience with materials such as plastic, leather, wood, and metal in a three-dimensional situation.</p>
Art 221B	<p><u>Design in Materials</u> - 3 Hours</p> <p>Advanced problems in three-dimensional design. Emphasis will be placed on practical design and its function in today's society.</p>
Art 311A	<p><u>Painting</u> - 3 Hours</p> <p>Composition in the paint media, to provide experience in color as it builds up form and space.</p>
Art 311B	<p><u>Painting</u> - 3 Hours</p> <p>Advanced composition in a desired painting medium. Further experimentation with color. Prerequisite: 311A</p>
Art 395	<p><u>Elementary Art Education</u> - 4 Hours</p> <p>Art for the education of children. Includes teaching objectives, observations, and creative use of art materials. For Elementary majors, class meets for four (4) lecture hours per week.</p>
Art 401	<p><u>Special Problems in Art</u> - 3 Hours</p> <p>Course by appointment with any of the full-time art faculty. Problems related to specific training within a specific area of art. This course may be repeated three times for a total of nine credits. Prerequisite: Junior or senior standing, consent of Instructor.</p>
Art 411A	<p><u>Painting</u> - 3 Hours</p> <p>Advanced composition in a desired painting medium to provide experience for advanced development.</p>

Art	411B	<u>Painting - 3 Hours</u> Advanced composition in various painting media to provide experience for advanced development.	220A	ART
Art	492	<u>Seminar in Art Education - 4 Hours</u> Presents a continuum in the theoretical experience and professional growth of the art specialist. For Art Education Majors.	220B	ART
Communications	465	<u>Public Relations - 3 Hours</u> Lecture, discussion, and practical application of the concept of public relations; public opinion; corporate relations; tools of public relations. Students will plan and execute a public relations campaign.	220A	ART
		<u>Design in Materials - 3 Hours</u> Three-dimensional design using materials such as paper, wood, metal, fabric, plastic, glass, etc. Emphasis will be placed on basic design principles.	220B	ART
