ISUE TO HOST REGIONAL COLLEGE FAIR. Students from Posey, Warrick, Gibson, Spencer and Dubois Counties have been invited to join Vanderburgh County students in a Regional College Fair on Sunday, October 23 from 1:00 to 4:30 p.m. in the Physical Activities Center. The Indiana Association of College Admissions Counselors, which sponsors the event, has initiated a regional approach to college fairs, rather than individual fairs held in each county or school.

More than 50 colleges have reserved space at the Fair. The individual colleges will have representatives available to talk about academic programs, academic procedures, campus life, costs, financial aid opportunities, and to answer questions about the individual institutions.

"Metric Measurements Revisited-Where Are We Now?" will be presented at the Engineering Design Graphics Division Mid-Year Meeting, American Society for Engineering Education (ASEE), to be in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania in January, 1984. "The Faculty View of the ASEE Creative Engineering Design Display" will be presented at the ASEE Annual Conference in Salt Lake City, Utah in June, 1984. "The Interactive Generation of Simultaneous Orthographic and Isometric Images With A Microcomputer" will be presented at the Second International Conference on Descriptive Geometry to be held in Beijing, China in August, 1984. He also has textbooks entitled "Problems in Engineering Drawing" and "Fundamentals of Engineering Drawing" under contract.
