SEDER SUPPER. The ISUE Campus Ministry and the student organization IXOUS are sponsoring a Seder Supper, the traditional Jewish meal commemorating the Jewish Passover, April 4 in the University Center Cafeteria. The Jewish Passover marks historically the departure of the Israelites from Egyptian bondage.

Mrs. Sadelle Berger of Evansville will lead the service combining songs, prayers and responsive readings with a meal which is rich

in Jewish symbolism. Mrs. Berger is president of the Adath Israel Temple on Washington Avenue in Evansville.

According to Terri Weber, a IXOUS member who is helping plan the event, "the supper will offer the opportunity for the community to share in the Jewish ritual which is not often available outside the Jewish homes and synagogue."

Reservations for the supper should be made by calling ISUE extension 1863 by March 30. The price for adults is \$3.75 with children under twelve attending for half price.

The ecumenical event is open to the general public and members of all faiths are encouraged to attend.

ISUE PLAY SCHEDULED MARCH 25, 26, 27. Indiana State University Evansville will present the play "George Washington Slept Here" on March 25, 26 and 27 at the ISUE Playhouse. "George Washington Slept Here" was written by Moss Hart and George S. Kaufman, the writing team that wrote "You Can't Take It With You" and "The Man Who Came to Dinner."

"George Washington Slept Here" chronicles an episode in the lives of Newton Fuller and his family. He has finally gotten "that little place in the country to call his own." Little does he realize, however, that country living is not what its "cracked up" to be. Before long he is involved in a search for water, a quarrel with a neighbor who owns not only the brook but the very road that leads from the highway to the house, the attempted elopement of the daughter with a summer-theatre actor, and the usual invasion of the weekend guests, including a prodigal uncle who is assumed to be rich. On top of all that, Newton Fuller discovers George Washington did not sleep in the house after all; Benedict Arnold slept there.

CHILDREN'S ART WORKSHOP OFFERED. A Children's Art Workshop will be offered by Indiana State University Evansville for six Saturdays beginning March 19, 1977. Children in Grades 1 through 6 will explore these art processes: clay, weaving, printmaking, drawing sculpture, and painting.

Mrs. Melody Lewis, an elementary art teacher in Mt. Vernon, Indiana will teach the course, which will be offered from 10:00 a.m. to noon in Room 191 of the Science Center each Saturday. The registration fee is \$25.00.

The children will learn the elements and principles of design and the cultural heritage of the media involved. Most materials and supplies will be furnished. Scrap materials from home may be requested occasionally. Enrollment will be limited to 30.
