USI PROFESSOR TO EXHIBIT "THE WONDER OF WORK"

An unusual combination of engineering and art has resulted in the exhibition, "Great Engineering is Great Art," which will be on display December 8-11 at Midstates Contemporary Gallery, 208 Main Street, on the Downtown Evansville Walkway.

The exhibit, prepared by **Mr. Augustine "Jay" Fredrich**, professor of civil engineering technology, showcases images created by **Mr. Joseph Pennell**, a Philadelphia-born illustrator and artist whose pen-and-ink drawings, etchings, and lithographs depicting what he called "The Wonder of Work" are included in museum collections around the world. Mr. Pennell's "Wonder of Work" theme developed from his interest in capturing images of buildings, bridges, and other large engineering projects under construction.

The exhibit of famous projects will be shown on Tuesday, December 7, to members of the local chapter, American Society of Civil Engineers (ASCE), and their guests. It will be available to the public during regular hours at Midstates Gallery: 10:30 a.m.-5 p.m. Wednesday-Friday, December 8-9-10; 7-9 p.m. Friday, December 10; and 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturday, December 11.

Mr. Fredrich, chair of USI's Engineering Technology Department, prepared the exhibition for display at the 1993 ASCE National Convention in October in Dallas, Texas. It also will be shown in March at the 1994 annual meeting of the Indiana Section, ASCE, to be held at Conner Prairie Museum, Indianapolis, and in September 1994 at the 100th anniversary convention of the American Public Works Association at McCormick Place, Chicago.

Mr. Fredrich embarked on his project after a November 1989 visit to the Prints and Photographs Room of the Library of Congress, in a search for photographs of historic bridges. A library staff member who had organized an exhibit of Panama Canal images suggested Mr. Fredrich might find interesting images in the Pennell collection.

"Indeed, I did," Mr. Fredrich wrote in the acknowledgements section of the exhibit guide. "In less than an hour I had seen enough to know that civil engineers interested in the history of their profession would be fascinated by Pennell's work."

Although Mr. Pennell spent most of his career living in London and producing images of European scenes, he returned to the U.S. periodically and created images of famous structures such as Eads' bridge across the Mississippi River. St. Louis, and the steel

bridge across the Niagara River below Niagara Falls.

He also was captivated by the emergence of the skyscraper as a building form and created dozens of etchings of skyscrapers under construction. His most important work is a series of 28 lithographs of the Panama Canal under construction. Eight of these images are included in Mr. Fredrich's exhibit. Mr. Pennell's Panama Canal lithographs are the only images of their type and are the most widely admired of the thousands he produced in an artistic career that spanned nearly 50 years.

Mr. Fredrich spent four years preparing his exhibit, supported by two Faculty Creative Work grants awarded by the USI Faculty and Academic Affairs Committee from USI Foundation funds. The exhibition has been drawn from numerous sources, the Library of Congress and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, among others. While preparing the exhibit, Mr. Fredrich discovered the Evansville Museum of Arts and Science had several Pennell prints which he has included in the exhibition.

RECYCLING HITS A SNAG

USI's paper recycling program has hit a snag. The wholesaler is finding large amounts of contaminants in USI recycled paper. These can be anything from candy bar wrappers to high-gloss printed paper.

At this time, USI has two recycle categories: white paper (computer paper, white bond typing paper, or office paper) and newspaper quality (colored paper, newsprint, magazines, etc.). All other papers are contaminants which cause an entire load to be rejected and sent to the landfill.

The recycle program was designed to reduce the amount of paper going to the landfill, so rejects make things worse rather than better.
