Mrs. Clark, a native of Lebanon, Kentucky, received her B.S. in accounting from Campbellsville (Kentucky) College in 1983, and completed work on her M.S. in 1985 at Northwestern University, where she was a teaching assistant. MAGAZINE SUBSCRIPTION ALERT. The USI Office of Safety and Security has passed along a notice from the Weekly Bulletin of the National Association of College Stores, which warns of a magazine subscription scam that occurred at Indiana University of Pennsylvania. The bulletin states that phony magazine subscriptions were sold by salespeople who posed as students claiming they were in a contest to win a trip to Europe. The sellers allegedly work for Aristocrat Company of Spring, Texas, previously known as Summit Publishers Service. Anyone hearing of unauthorized solicitation on the USI campus is asked to notify security at extension 1780.

"TALENT SEARCH" AT HISTORIC NEW HARMONY. A search for anyone in the area with talents in early 19th Century crafts is being conducted by Historic New Harmony, Inc., for use in projects involving elementary school children. Talent is needed in the areas of: the making of butter, cheese, jam, jelly, kraut, bread, shoes, pottery (red clay), candles (dipping), brooms, baskets, and lye soap; vegetable dyeing or canning; cold-pack meat canning; sheep shearing; tinsmithing or blacksmithing; stitchery (candle wicking, sampler, tatting); chair caning; tole painting; silhouette cutting; apiarist (bee keeper); black powder guns; musical instruments (harpsichord, dulcimer, etc.); dried fruits, vegetables, herbs, and flowers; or any other craft of the period.
