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MANAGEMENT DIAGNOSTIC CENTER WINS HONORS. USI's Management Diagnostic Center, a program developed in 1986 by the Office of Continuing Education to assist businesses and individuals with management development, has been selected as the winner of the 1986 NUCEA (National University Continuing Education Association) Division of Business, Industry, and Labor Program Development Award. USI's program was among 15 nominated for this year's national recognition. **Mr. Larry Bohleber**, coordinator of business and professional programs and a USI business instructor, will accept the award at NUCEA's annual meeting April 5 in Kansas City.

NUCEA is the national organization devoted to continuing higher education whose awards programs allow members to showcase their projects before and within the nation's continuing higher education community. The Program Development Award was established to recognize institutions making meritorious contributions to program development for business, industry, labor, and the professions. Programs are judged on the following criteria: 1) the development of an innovative or collection of innovative programs; 2) the acceptance level of the program among target clientele, and 3) the impact of the program upon the clientele groups served and upon the educational institution delivering the service.

USI's Management Diagnostic Center is believed to be the first university-based management diagnostic program to use assessment center methodology and is available for both company and individual participation. The program is the outgrowth of discussions with the business community and has advisory support from area personnel and training directors. Participants go through simulations and exercises in which they encounter challenges and tasks common to a broad spectrum of supervisory and management positions. The simulations are based on actual management situations, giving an individual with management aspirations the opportunity to decide if he or she really wants to make such a career move. Trained assessors observe and evaluate a participant's behavior; their assessments are combined to produce an overall profile which identifies strengths and weaknesses and recommends specific professional development activities. Mr. Bohleber said some large corporations use their own assessment programs to determine which employee or applicant is best suited to move into a specific managerial position, but they have not used the assessment center methodology to develop comprehensive diagnostic profiles of individual training needs. The USI program "would be difficult to find anywhere in the country," Mr. Bohleber said.

ENLOW DISTINGUISHED SCHOLAR. Mr. Karl Haas, who for 26 years has been the host of the National Public Radio broadcast, "Adventures in Good Music," will spend two days at the University and New Harmony this week as the Enlow Distinguished Humanities Scholar. Mr. Haas will present lecture-performances at 2 p.m. Thursday, March 19, and 11 a.m. Friday, March 20, in Forum I at USI. A renowned concert pianist-conductor, he will present a recital at 8 p.m. Friday, March 20, at Murphy Auditorium at New Harmony. The respective programs at USI are titled "The Creator: A Child of His Times" and "Being Social with the Arts?" In "The Viennese Classics: The Leading Position of Vienna in Music and Its Influence on Succeeding Generations" at New Harmony, Mr. Haas will feature the music of Haydn, Mozart, Beethoven, and Schubert. All programs are open to the public. Although there will be an admission charge for the New Harmony concert of \$8 for regular tickets, \$4 for students, the lecture-performances at USI are free. (Tickets for the New Harmony concert are available to all USI faculty and staff members at the \$4 student price; contact Mrs. Ruth Roat, special assistant in the Division of Humanities, extension 1746.)

AUTOMATED CIRCULATION. The USI Library is making final preparation to go on-line with the new automated circulation system (GEAC). When the system is in full operation, faculty, staff, students, and the public who have barcoded IDs no longer will have to fill out the check-out cards. To help make a smooth transfer to the new system, the Library is asking faculty members to bring IDs to the Library between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. Monday through Friday, to have a barcode assigned. (If you haven't received an ID, check with the Personnel Office about proper procedure). Those who have business in or near the Library may leave their IDs for a few minutes and retrieve them as they leave the area or, if preferred, the IDs will be delivered to individual offices the next weekday. It is hoped most faculty IDs will be processed by Wednesday, March 25. You are encouraged to use the barcoded ID to check out items after that date; it will save you time and serve as a trial run for Library staff during the transitional period before the students and public have access to the automated system.

TRIP TO ITALY PLANNED. **Dr. Dan Scavone**, professor of history, is organizing an 18-day trip to Italy that will include stopovers in London en route to and from Venice. The group will spend a day in Venice, two days at Sorrento with a side trip to the Isle of Capri, three days in Rome, and a day in Florence before returning to Venice.

The excursion will include stops at numerous historic cities such as Assisi, Sorrento, Pompeii, and Pisa. The trip is being arranged for either May 8-25 or May 15-June 1; the price ranges from \$1,562 to \$1,455 per person depending upon the number in the tour group. A \$50 non-refundable deposit is required by Friday, March 20, and will be credited to the overall cost. One to three hours of academic credit will be available for qualifying persons.
