Student Art Exhibition, lecture

Dr. Howard Risatti, professor of art history at Virginia Commonwealth University, has been selected as juror for the 1995 USI Student Art Exhibition, which will open Sunday, April 16, with a 2 p.m. reception for the artists in the University Conference Center. The awards ceremony will be at 3 p.m. and the show will remain available for public viewing from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. April 18-24.

Dr. Risatti's areas of expertise are 20th century and contemporary art criticism. He is the Washington, D.C., correspondent for *Artforum* magazine, the Virginia editor for the *New Art Examiner*, and a contributor to other art magazines such as *Artscribe* and *Art Papers*. His most recent publication is *Post-Modern Perspectives: Issues in Contemporary Art*, an anthology of contemporary criticism published in 1991 by Prentice-Hall.

Dr. Risatti will present a public lecture, "Cyberspace, Cynical Abstraction: Implications for Painting and Sculpture," in which he will focus on the transformation of society and the visual arts as a result of new technology, and predict what both will look like in 50 years. The lecture will be presented at 7 p.m. Wednesday, April 12, in The Athenaeum at New Harmony, sponsored by USI, the USI Art Club, and the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art. A reception will follow at the Gallery.

Names in the news:

The entire issue of *The Indiana Historian*, February 1995, is devoted to research and writing by Dr. Darrel E. Bigham, professor of history, on the history of African Americans in Evansville to the year 1950. The 16-page publication is designed for use by elementary and secondary students and is produced by the Indiana Historical Bureau. The title of the issue is taken from the oral history of the late Mr. Alfred Porter, educator and administrator in the Evansville-Vanderburgh School Corporation whose reminiscences are in the USI Special Collections. Recalling a parade in Evansville

in the late 1930s in which his Lincoln High School Band was told to "just fall in," Mr. Porter said, "We don't intend to fall in any more at the end of the parade." Thereafter local bands marched in alphabetical order or according to a drawing of the order of march.

Mr. Gary May, assistant professor of social work, presented two workshops last week for the National Association of Social Workers Indiana Chapter State Conference. The titles were "The Potential for Systemic Change: The Agent Orange Class Assistance Program Experience" and "Disability Issues in Contemporary Society: Attitudinal Barriers." Both were selected through a juried process.

Mr. May currently serves on the editorial board for a new electronic journal, "Traumatology," which is available to subscribers on the Internet. The journal is moderated by Dr. Charles Figley at Florida State's School of Social Work. Mr. May is a member of an FSU research team which is studying innovative treatment models for post traumatic stress disorder.

Mr. Elliot Wasserman's short play, *Outlaws*, which premiered at the Actors Theatre of Louisville, has just been published by Mr. Samuel French in Volume 3 of *Ten-Minute Plays from Actors Theatre of Louisville*.
