EMPLOYEES SURPASS UNITED FUND GOAL. Employees of ISUE contributed \$3470.69 to the United Fund this year, a 10.2% increase over last year's contributions of \$3148.90. The contributions, made by 65% of the University employees, exceeded the University goal of \$3285.75 by \$184.94. FREE SEMINAR ON COLLEGE OFFERED TO AREA WOMEN. A free seminar entitled "Everything Women Have Always Wanted to Know About Going to College (but didn't know who to ask)" will be held November 21 from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon in Room 100 of the Library.

The purpose of the seminar is to acquaint women of all ages with programs available at the University. Special emphasis will be given to the woman student over 25 years of age. Coordinator of Women's Programs, MRS. SYLVIA WEINZAPFEL, stated that women over the age of 25 make up 11 percent of ISUE's student population and that a panel of these women students would be at the seminar to share their experiences with other women considering college work.

GIFTS TO HELP RESTORE APPLACHIAN BARN. The Westwood Garden Club has established a fund to restore an Appalachian Barn on campus in the Bent Twig Outdoor Learning Environment. The barn was originally located on the farm of Fronie Schmitt, a relative of Mr. Curt Huber, Evansville realtor. WOMEN IN GOVERNMENT GRANT. ISUE has been awarded a \$1549.00 grant from the Indiana Committee for the Humanities. The purpose of the grant is to bring an awareness to women, through dialogue, of opportunities in elective and appointive government office. DR. HAROLD CASSIDY TO SPEAK. Dr. Harold Cassidy, Professor Emeritus of chemistry at Yale University, who worked on the top-secret Manhattan Project resulting in the atom bomb, will speak on campus Tuesday, November 20. He will address the engineering technology seminar at 1:00 p.m. in Room A126 and at 7:00 p.m. he will address a group in the University Center Conference Center. Dr. Cassidy will discuss the impact of the further development of nuclear energy upon the public safety and quality of the environment in the U.S. Both meetings are open to the public. His address will be given in the non-technical language and will be easily understood by the layman.

His visit is sponsored by the Committee for Environmental Ethics, the Student Union Board, Student Government Association, Science Club, Sigma Zeta Science Honorary, Student Branch of the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers and the Student Club of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers.
