The 1992-93 student leadership awards were presented to **Mr. Ronald R. Allen**, **Ms. Susan R. McGregor**, **Ms. Nancy Sieben**, and **Mr. Michael Vreeland** at the recent Student Honors Banquet. Ms. Sieben and Mr. Vreeland received the All-Campus Student Achievement Award and Mr. Allen and Ms. McGregor were named Outstanding Greek Man and Woman.

Ms. Sieben, a communications graduate who also earned an A.A. in business, plans to seek an M.B.A. She was vice-president of Student Government Association for two terms, 1992 Outstanding Member, active with Order of Omega, Delta Zeta, and Panhellenic Council; 1993 Homecoming Queen and 1991 Coed of the Year; and served on committees for Student Trustee Search, Student Publications, and Security Act Compliance. ## DARRELL, ELLIOTT, RICE, SCHUTZ RECEIVE 1993 ALUMNI AWARDS

USI Alumni Association awards honoring those who have made major contributions to the improvement and growth of the University were presented at the association's annual Senior Reception and Dinner May 7 at the Ramada Inn.

The 1993 honorees include: Faculty Recognition Award -- **Dr. Sherry Bevins Darrell**, professor of English; Distinguished Alumni Award -- **Dr. Steven K. Elliott**, 1972 graduate who is an Evansville family practice physician; Special Recognition Award -- **Mrs. Betty Rice**, first lady of the University for 26 years; and Alumni Service Award -- **Mr. John Shutz**, 1982 business administration graduate and Evansville investment broker.

Dr. Darrell joined the USI faculty in 1975 and also has been coordinator for Academic Skills (1978-83) and General Studies Advising (1983-85). She has coordinated the USI Honors Day and now directs the School of Liberal Arts segment of Honors Week. Dr. Darrell has helped bring noted writers and speakers to campus, and volunteers to edit and revise the University Cata-

log. It was through her efforts that the President's Medal was established as the highest honor accorded a graduating senior. She helped organize the USI Chapter of Alpha Chi and served as advisor until 1991. Dr. Darrell is the author of numerous articles and publications on Shakespeare, Greek tragedy, professional writing, and women in literature and is one of several contributors to a just-published book on teaching Shakespeare. A book-length study of ancient Greek women, *Speaking Her Peace*, is under consideration with a publisher. She earned a B.A. at McMurry College in Abilene, Texas, and M.A. and Ph.D. from George Peabody College for Teachers in Nashville.

Dr. Elliott graduated from USI with a B.S. in life science, completed his medical degree at the IU School of Medicine in 1976, finalized his family practice residency and board certification in 1979, and returned to Evansville to establish a practice. He was one of three founding directors of the Washington Avenue Health Care Center, a neighborhood clinic for adults

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Sigma Tau Gamma Sweetheart, and 1992 Sigma Tau Gamma White Rose Sweetheart national finalist.

Three USI faculty members became U.S. citizens during naturalization ceremonies May 6 in Evansville.

The new citizens are **Dr. Eva K. Jermakowicz**, assistant professor of accounting, and her husband, **Dr. Walter W. Jermakowicz**, professor of management, and **Dr. Marwan A. Wafa**, associate professor of decision sciences. Dr. Wafa's wife, **Sahar M. Al Masri**, also became an American citizen.

The Jermakowiczes fled Communist rule in Poland and came to the U.S. eight years ago. He joined the USI faculty in 1985; she completed a degree at USI, then joined the faculty in 1987.

The Wafas are Palestinians who were born in Kuwait, lived in Jordan, and had no homeland until last week. Dr. Wafa joined the USI faculty in 1986. His effort now will be to bring his father to the U.S. to become a citizen.

State University branch campus that in 1985 became Indiana's fifth baccalaureate institution. Virtually an unpaid staff member in campus development, she created and hosted events, educated people about USI's role, generated student resources, and linked USI with the community. Mrs. Rice is a cheerleader, teacher, mentor, and friend to USI students, working from a strong belief that students, parents, and alumni should feel a part of the USI family. One of the University's most active civic volunteers, she has held leadership roles in Raintree Council for Girl Scouts, American Association of University Women, United Way, and the YWCA. Mrs. Rice is a home economist with a master's degree from Purdue University, and a member of the Vanderburgh Extension Homemakers, Evansville Home Economists, and Westwood Garden Club. She formerly

owned and operated Peckenpaugh's Garden Center and remains involved with its operation.

Mr. Schutz was a field manager with Mid-Central Land Services Oil Company until joining Hilliard-Lyons in 1986. His service to USI includes legendary volunteer work for the USI Alumni Telefund. The telefund climbed from \$35,000 to more than \$55,000 in annual giving during his tenure as chairman (1988-91); he coordinated volunteers, welcoming, training, and encouraging them to exceed nightly goals. In 1991, he assisted with the merger of the Alumni Telefund with the USI Foundation Annual Fund.
