



## National Chemistry Week observances

These will be featured when the public is invited to participate in many of the events scheduled in the National Chemistry Week observance November 2-8, sponsored by the Indiana/Kentucky Border Section of the American Chemical Society (ACS). Some events are sponsored jointly by USI, the University of Evansville, Washington Square Mall, and the Evansville Museum of Arts and Science.

The opening session will be at the Museum on Sunday, November 2, with demonstrations from 1:30 to 2:30 p.m. and hands-on activities until 4 p.m.

During the week, Indiana/Kentucky Border Section members, USI and UE student

affiliates, and some local high school teachers and their students will visit more than 80 fourth-grade classes to help students conduct hands-on experiments.

Also, USI radio station WSWI (820 AM) will conduct a "Name That Element" contest in which the first person able to name a mystery element will win a Pan One Pizza from Noble Romans. Pizzas will be awarded several times each day of the week.

**Dr. Marie G. Hankins**, chair of the USI Chemistry Department, will conduct a special chemical demonstration at 2 p.m. Thursday, November 6, in Mitchell Auditorium. All USI students and the public are invited.

## Gospel program to feature Carlis Moody

A program of gospel music featuring **Mr. Carlis Lee Moody, Jr.**, of Evanston, Illinois, will be held at 6 p.m. Saturday, November 8, in Mitchell Auditorium, sponsored by the Multicultural Center and USI Gospel Choir.

The program will include the music of the Vincennes University Gospel Choir, Bible Center Cathedral Choir, and the Nazarene Baptist Church Choir. A reception will follow the program, which is free and open to the public.

Mr. Moody has been minister of music for 23 years at the Faith Temple Church of God in Christ, Evanston. He is a state director of the First Jurisdiction of Illi-

nois State Choir and has sang his gospel music in 31 countries around the world.

Mr. Moody began composing music at age 11, and has now written more than 125 songs. His songs, "Available To You" and "Through God's Eyes," have won Dove, Grammy, or Stella awards. His music has been sung by such performers as Thompson Community Singers, Babbie Mason, First Jurisdiction of Illinois State Choir, Dan Willis and the Pentecostals, Olanda Draper and the Associates, David Curry and the Curry Family, and others, on a variety of labels. In July 1995, Mr. Moody's first solo album, "Refreshing," was released on the CGI/POLYGRAM label.

About 1,000 second- and third-grade students from Christ the King, Corpus Christi, Good Shepherd, Holy Redeemer, Holy Rosary, Holy Spirit, Resurrection, St. Benedict, St. James, St. John at Newburgh, St. Theresa, and West Side Catholic Consolidated schools will attend November 4.

The next exhibition at the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art — "Manifestations: Mixed Media Assemblages" by **Mr. Robert Peppers** of Ohio University-Athens — will open with a reception for the artist from 5 to 7 p.m. Saturday, November 1. The exhibition runs November 2-December 23. It is supported by USI and the Indiana Arts Commission. The Gallery at 506 Main is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday.

For this exhibition, Mr. Peppers has created a series of assemblages that reflect his deep interest in outsider-folk art and the black church. Some themes included good and evil, hope and despair, and the sacred and secular, and reflect ideas as diverse as recent fires that destroyed African-American churches to an exuberant celebration of black devotion.

Mr. Peppers is an associate professor at Ohio University. Some of his solo and group exhibitions include "Art and Social Justice," Colfax Culture Center Heritage Foundation, South Bend; "Burnt Offerings," Trisolini Gallery, OU; and "Exhibition 280: Works on the Wall," Huntington Museum of Art, West Virginia. He is the recipient of numerous awards and grants, including "Best of Show" at the 18th Black Art Exhibition at the African American Museum in Dallas, and an Ohio University Creative Activity Grant.
