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ARTS/HUMANITIES SOCIETY ORGANIZED AT USI. The USI Society for Arts & Humanities has been organized as a division of the USI Foundation to ensure greater visibility and support for the University's arts and humanities programs. **Dr. James Blevins**, chairman of the Division of Humanities, said the society was developed over the summer by a group of people interested not only in the enhancement of existing programs -- the Humanities Forum, Enlow Distinguished Scholar, Faculty and Student Art exhibitions, and USI Theatre -- but in broadening USI's arts and humanities efforts for the benefit of the community. "Liaison is needed to assure that we know what the community wants and needs and that the community knows our needs and how they can be supported. We believe the involvement of more people will benefit both the University and southern Indiana," Dr. Blevins said.

The Society has elected **Mr. Robert Carithers**, an Evansville businessman, as the first chairman; **Mr. Edward Johnson**, Evansville attorney, vice chairman; and **Mrs. Susan Partenheimer** of Princeton, Indiana, secretary. A membership drive will be one of the early efforts. Membership will be offered in categories of collegiate, \$5; individual, \$15; family, \$25; contributing, \$50; and patron, \$100. Dr. Blevins said funds will be earmarked for such specific goals as enhancement of the Humanities Forum and USI Theatre programs, art exhibitions, and the Enlow Distinguished Scholar series, along with initiating Artist-, Writer-, Theatre Director-, or Scholar-in-Residence and other faculty and student development programs. A long-term goal may be the establishment of an Art Center on the USI campus. Persons interested in becoming members of the Society may contact any of the officers or Dr. Blevins for details.

NAMES IN THE NEWS. **Dr. Dona Frost**, USI professor of business, was elected to a four-year term on the 15-member Administrative Board, the governing body for Delta Kappa Gamma Society, at the organization's international convention August 4-10 in Indianapolis. The professional organization for women educators, headquartered in Austin, Texas, has 162,000 members and awards 22 international scholarships annually. Dr. Frost has been chairman of the society's Personnel Committee for the past four years.

Dr. Robert E. Gehring, associate professor of psychology, was first author of a paper presented at the August 24 meeting of the American Psychological Association in Washington, D.C. "Recall of Enacted Events with Verbal or Visual-Imagery Rehearsal" presented data in support of the hypothesis that the most efficient informational learning involves pictorial presentation plus student imagination as a study strategy.

"The Owenite Tradition in America," written by Dr. Donald E. Pitzer, professor of history, has been published in Japanese translation as a chapter in Robert Owen and the Co-Operative Movement (Tokyo, 1986) by the Robert Owen Association of Japan. Dr. Pitzer also has been appointed to the board of directors of the Fellowship for Intentional Community, a new national association to promote the study and dissemination of information on current communal living in America.

PRINTMAKER EXHIBITION AT NEW HARMONY. Mr. Bill Whorrall, an Indiana native and recent graduate of Indiana University, lectured throughout the two countries in 1985, meeting many of the artists included in the exhibition during his travels. The exhibition, which also will travel to Bloomington and Indianapolis, will be enhanced by a free slide lecture by Mr. Whorrall, covering his travels and experiences with the artists. MESSAGE FROM THE AFFIRMATIVE ACTION OFFICE. The Affirmative Action Plan for the University of Southern Indiana outlines the University's commitment to the principles of nondiscrimination and its assurance of compliance with national, state, and local civil rights legislation and enactment.

The University of Southern Indiana reaffirms its present policy of nondiscrimination and equal employment opportunity with respect to recruitment, hiring, training, promotion, and treatment of persons in all organizations, services, and programs under the legal control of the Trustees of the University of Southern Indiana which shall be maintained on a nondiscriminatory basis in regard to race, sex, religion, handicap, age, or national origin at all times.

Included in the plan are guidelines for disabled veterans, veterans of the Vietnam era, and handicapped persons. Also outlined are the guidelines on sexual harassment, acting appointments, and the procedures to follow in filling open positions.

The University of Southern Indiana will continue to take positive actions to ensure against discrimination directed to all persons. All members of the faculty and staff are expected to give full support to the University's commitment to equal opportunity and affirmative action.

LYLES STATION CENTENNIAL SLATED. The Centennial Anniversary of the Black community of Lyles Station in Gibson County will be observed in special programs and services Saturday and Sunday, August 30-31. The community was founded by **Mr. Joshua Lyles**, a liberated slave who came from Tennessee in the mid-19th century, and was named in his honor in 1886. The centennial program will start with a social hour and banquet at 6 p.m. Saturday at the Holiday Inn, Princeton. **Dr. Virgil A. Clift** of Princeton will be the speaker. **Dr. John W. Lyda** of Terre Haute will speak at an 11 a.m. service Sunday in Wayman Chapel AME Church. A 3 p.m. Centennial Service at the church will feature **Mr. Alonzo Field** of Medford, Massachusetts, as speaker and the dedication of a historical plaque by **Dr. Carl C. Lyles**, an adjunct lecturer in education at USI and descendant of Joshua Lyles. A reprint of Dr. Lyles' book, Lyles Station Yesterday and Today, will be available. The public is invited to join in the centennial celebration. Citizen support in funding the observance is sought, with donation categories of contributor, \$5-\$24; patron, \$25-\$49; sponsor, \$50-\$99; and Century Club, \$100 or more.

HUMANITIES FILM SERIES. The Humanities Film Series, now under the direction of **Dr. Thomas Wilhelmus**, associate professor of English, will get under way Tuesday, September 2, with the showing of "The Heiress" (1949, 115 minutes). It was directed by William Wyler and starred Olivia deHavilland, Montgomery Clift, Ralph Richardson, and Miriam Hopkins. The film is based on a popular Broadway play, which in turn was based on Henry James's novel, Washington Square, and gave Ms. deHavilland a second Academy Award.
