Survivor of Rwandan genocide to speak

Dr. Tharcisse Seminega will present his account as a Tutsi survivor of the 1994 Rwandan genocide at 7 p.m. Wednesday, November 15, in Carter Hall in the University Center. His presentation is a highlight of International Education Week (November 13-17).

Seminega was born and raised in Rwanda. He was serving as senior lecturer at the National University of Rwanda in Butare, southern Rwanda, when the events that led to the genocide took place. More than 50 Tutsi and moderate Hutu professors were killed in Butare. Seminega and his family of six were hidden by 20 people of the Hutu ethnic group, who risked their lives to save them. The Seminegas miraculously survived numerous life-threatening situations, but lost more than 100 relatives in the genocide. Following these traumatic events, they decided to immigrate to Toronto, Canada.

His survival account briefly describes Rwanda's historical origins prior to and in the wake of German, Belgian, and French colonialism in the region. He points out how hatred built up between the Hutu and Tutsi and shows the impact of colonialism in the long-term relations between the two ethnic groups and the escalation of hatred that took place, starting from the Tutsi rebel attack in 1990. He also will discuss his personal experiences and his view of the present situation in his country.

He holds a bachelor's degree in biological sciences from the University of Padova (Italy), a master's degree in nutrition and food science (applied biochemistry) from the University of Nancy (France), and a Ph.D. in biotechnology and food industry from the National Polytechnic Institute of Lorraine, School of Agriculture and Food Industry, Vandoeuvre-Les-Nancy (France). He speaks English, French, Italian, and three African languages.

Seminega also will offer a presentation for local high school students at noon and another program for Living Learning Community students that evening.

Hollywood's portrayal of Latinos

Dr. Chad Tew, assistant professor of online journalism, will present "Clash in Paradise: Exploring the Symptoms of Immigrant Protests in Hollywood's Portrayal of Latinos" at 3:30 p.m. Friday, November 17, in Kley Meyer Hall in the Liberal Arts Center. The lecture is part of the Liberal Arts Faculty Colloquium Series.

In the wake of nationwide immigrant protests in spring 2006 sparked by U.S. Rep. Jim Sensenbrenner's Immigration Enforcement Bill, Tew looks to the movies and finds evidence of building tension in U.S. Anglo-Latino relations since the 1980s.

"I'm going to look at 25 years of Hollywood, and see how films have given us a signal that not all is well between non-Latinos and Latinos in this country," he said. "This didn't happen all of the sudden."

The 1980s was the decade Mexicans became the largest foreign born population in the U.S., and when filmmakers such as Luiz Valdez, Sergio Arau, Gregory Nava, and Cheech Marin started addressing Latino-Anglo issues in film.

In Arau's film, "A Day without a Mexican," all the Latinos in California disappear. "California really relies on Mexicans. The economy can't exist in southern California without them," Tew said. "In the film, the Latinos want to be appreciated, but the problem is the whites don't appreciate the Mexicans until the very end, when the whole country is in chaos."

The protests triggered by the Sensenbrenner bill were dubbed

"A Day without a Latino."

"There was something brewing out there long before these protests, but it took the bill to actually anger people. Non-Latinos were taken by surprise by the protests. But if you look back to the 1980s at these early films, you can already start seeing that there is anger building. They were trying to say, 'Appreciate us; we're important.' But that message never got across to such an extent that people were surprised when the Latinos started protesting."

Some of the lecture is based on Tew's collaborative research with Dr. John Marambaio, professor of foreign languages and literatures at the University of San Diego.

Science and engineering fair

"A Midsummer Night's Dream"

USI Theatre presents *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, a play by William Shakespeare, Wednesday, November 8, through Sunday, November 19. According to **Elliot Wasserman**, assistant professor of theatre at USI and the production's director, *A Midsummer Night's Dream* is one of Shakespeare's most beloved comedies. It features mistaken identities, star-crossed lovers, fairies, and the famous play within the play by the "Rude Mechanicals."

Wasserman commented, "*A Midsummer Night's Dream* is beautiful, delightful, and mysterious down to its core. It has been a joy to all involved, and we can't wait to show our audiences what fun we've had."

Shan Jensen, assistant professor of theatre and costumer designer for the production, added, "The costumes in the play reflect the two very distinct worlds it represents, and what happens when one invades the other. We've chosen to envision members of the court as western imperialists going on safari. They approach their adventures in the forest as sport, but in fact, they become pawns in a much larger game being played by Oberon and Titania. The costumes for the fairies use very lush fabrics to create that sense of magic and power."
