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GROUNDBREAKING SLATED JUNE 1. The public is invited to attend a groundbreaking ceremony at 8:45 a.m. Wednesday, June 1, initiating construction in the \$7.8-million classroom building project at the University of Southern Indiana. The University Board of Trustees, area legislators, and representatives of the architects and contractors will participate in the ceremony. A tent will be set up to allow events to continue, rain or shine, and light refreshments will be served. Bids were received on the project May 19, coming in well under the architect's estimates. Contracts are expected to be awarded late this week, with the building scheduled for use in the fall of 1989. The new building will house classrooms, lecture and conference rooms, labs, faculty offices, and administrative offices for such student services as Admissions, Financial Aid, Registrar, Counseling, and Placement, as well as Continuing Education.

SUMMER HISTORY INSTITUTE. Wednesday, June 1, is the deadline to register for a Summer History Institute being presented by the USI Office of Continuing Education in cooperation with the Historic Southern Indiana Project. The institute will be held July 11-15 and will be valuable to teachers and those who plan group programs and trips and attractive to those who want to spend a week learning more about Historic Southern Indiana. Participants will tour the site of prehistoric communities at Angel Mounds; be introduced to early government in the Old Northwest at Vincennes and Corydon; learn about pioneer community building among Upland Southerners and Germans at Lincoln City, Ferdinand, and St. Meinrad; become acquainted with the two utopian communities in New Harmony; and explore Victorian lifestyles at the Reitz Home in Evansville and Culbertson Mansion in New Albany. A production of the "Young Abe Lincoln" outdoor musical drama at Lincoln State Park also is included.

Dr. Darrel Bigham, USI professor of history who is director of Historic Southern Indiana and a noted scholar on Indiana history, will be institute director. Participants will meet administrators of historic sites and receive special insights into the people and events that shaped present-day Indiana. The \$125 registration fee will include course materials; travel; admission fees; the "Young Abe Lincoln" ticket; and meals and overnight accommodations Thursday and Friday at Kordes Enrichment Center in Ferdinand (double occupancy; for single, add \$5). An hour of graduate credit in Indiana history can be obtained at an additional charge. 30 OFFERED NEW USI PRESIDENTIAL SCHOLARSHIP. The USI Foundation has inaugurated a new program in which students who apply at USI and are valedictorian or salutatorian in high schools commissioned by the Indiana Department of Public Instruction are

being offered annual scholarships valued at \$4,500. The awards are renewable for four years if the recipients remain full-time students with at least a 3.2 cumulative grade point average their freshman and sophomore years and a 3.4 GPA thereafter. To date, 30 scholarships have been offered to 1988 Indiana high school graduates who have applied at USI.

HSI BROCHURE AVAILABLE. "This is where Indiana began" is the message of a new brochure outlining the points of interest that are part of the Historic Southern Indiana Project. The three-color brochure was produced by Dr. Darrel Bigham, HSI director and USI professor of history, in cooperation with the Indiana Department of Commerce Tourism Development Division and the USI Foundation.
