UNIVERSITY ARCHIVES

In order to insure the preservation of the University's official files, records, and documents, the Indiana State University Evansville Archives is designated as the official depository for the University's official files, records, documents, and copies of all official publications. These papers are being collected and preserved for their historical, legal, administrative and financial value.

The administrative officers and members of the faculty whose duties put them in possession of official records, are requested to observe the following:

1. Records produced by the University officers and all offices in the performance of official activities are the property of Indiana State University Evansville.
2. This property is not to be destroyed without the approval of (a) the officer in charge of the department, and (b) the University Archivist.
3. The officer in charge of each administrative office will determine when records are no longer currently needed. These will then be sent to the Archives for determination as to permanent value to the University.
4. If restrictions of time limit or accessibility are needed in the use of confidential records they will be determined by the officers and Archivist at this time.
5. The University Archives solicits the personal papers of faculty, administrative officers, and other University employees and officials.

FOREIGN STUDENT INTERVIEW

In the following weeks, we will be printing interviews with ISUE's foreign students. If you haven't had an opportunity to meet or talk with any of the ones to be appearing in this column, we know you will enjoy learning a little about these students.

RANCHOR S. PATEL, a senior majoring in Management and Accounting, was born in Bombay, India. At 8 years old, he moved with his family to London, England, where his parents and sister still live. After attending school in London, he came to the United States and attended Kansas City Business College one year, a junior college for two years, and came to ISUE in 1973. His coming to ISUE appears to be a happy coincidence. On his way to interview at GAF Corp. in Mt. Vernon, he met *Dr. Dona Frost*, Professor of Business, on the plane. After becoming acquainted, she advised him about ISUE and later introduced him to *Dr. Settle* and others. Ranchor commented that he likes ISUE and thinks very highly of the faculty members. He also plans to bring his sister Vanita here for her college education when she finishes high school.

Ranchor has traveled extensively over the United States on vacations and has flown to Europe once and home to London twice during his four years in the U.S. This summer he plans to visit his grandparents and other relatives in India.
