NAMES IN THE NEWS. **Dr. Thomas M. Rivers,** professor of English, was the guest speaker Monday, October 20, at the Ohio Valley Writers Guild meeting. He spoke on the relationship between writing and speaking and the formation of character.

Dr. Daniel C. Scavone, professor of history, presented his information on "The Shroud of Turin" at two notable summer engagements and is slated to discuss the Shroud and other topics at several future meetings. The first two were the Junior Classical League's national meeting in July at Indiana University, and the opening school convocation in August for the Oakland City College Graduate School of Theology. Dr. Scavone will discuss "Ancient Rome and Modern America" at an in-service workshop on ancient history being held today (October 22) for social science teachers of the Evansville-Vanderburgh School Corporation, and will read a paper on "The Turin Shroud in Constantinople: The Documentary Evidence" at the October 25 Conference for the Advancement of Early Studies (CAES) at Ball State University. He gave a slide talk, "The Historical Dracula," at the October 13 meeting of Psi Iota XI philanthropic sorority and will repeat it at 6:15 p.m. Sunday, October 26, at a North Side Congregational Church meeting at the Triple T Center; the public is invited. Dr. Scavone also is slated to discuss the Shroud on Monday, October 27, in Terre Haute, November 8 in Indianapolis, and November 13-14 at a meeting of the Virginia Chapter of the Junior Classical League in Norfolk, Virginia.

Ms. Grace Waitman, 11-year-old daughter of **Dr. Michael Waitman,** associate professor of English, has won honors in two more art competitions. Her work was one of three winners in the 10-to-12-year-old category of the recent "Cartoon Strip Contest" in the WIKY Kid's Day program at the Evansville Museum of Arts and Science. In addition, her drawing submitted for the Children's Art Festival at Mesker Zoo will be among those used in billboard displays in the Tri-State in November, prior to the third annual Festival of Trees on November 12-16 at the Green Convention Center.

NEW HARMONY INFORMANCE. **Mr. Stephen McKinley Henderson** will be the featured guest for an informance at 10 a.m. Saturday, October 25, at Clowes Theatre in the Atheneum at Historic New Harmony, Inc. An informance is an informal performance that encourages interaction between the artist, the audience, and the art form, creating a dynamic and personal art experience. Mr. Henderson began his career at the Loretto-Hilton Repertory Company in St. Louis and was chosen by John Houseman and Michael Kahn to be one of the first class of drama students at the Julliard School. He has taught acting at Towson State University, North Carolina School of the Arts, and Purdue University, where he earned his master's degree in theatre. He was selected to join the roster of Affiliate Artists, Inc., in 1985.

WRITERS' CONFERENCE. The Ohio River Writers' Conference will be held Thursday through Saturday, October 23-25, at the University of Evansville. It was organized and funded by UE, USI, Evansville Arts and Education Council, Ohio Valley Writers Guild, Indiana Committee for the Humanities, and The Evansville Courier. Major authors participating in this year's event are **Mr. Hal Crowther**, a Canadian who has worked for major newspapers and news magazines and has written a column for and edited Spectator magazine since 1978; **Mr. Dave Smith**, an award-winning poet and professor of English at Virginia Commonwealth University; **Ms. Lee Smith**, an award-winning fiction writer and associate professor of English at North Carolina State University.
