## Workshops examining cyber abuse

Two "Wild Wild Web" workshops examining online harassment and cyber abuse will be held at USI Tuesday, October 29.

The first workshop, exclusively for USI faculty and staff, will be presented from 9 a.m. to noon in rooms 201-203 of the University Center. Another workshop will be offered to the public from 7 to 9 p.m. in Mitchell Auditorium.

Jayne A. Hitchcock, president of Working to Halt Online Abuse, will be the speaker. Hitchcock, who experienced cyber stalking firsthand, trains law enforcement personnel and security to work with victims of online harassment. She also educates the general public about the dangers associated with online abuse and ways to be cautious when using the Internet.

Hitchcock serves as a volunteer for the Department of Justice Office for Victims of Crime and the National Center for Victims of Crime. She is the author of several books detailing specific instances of online crime and ways to protect people from being

victims. She also has been involved in the passage of new legislation addressing online harassment.

Brandi Watson, sexual assault program coordinator for Albion Fellows Bacon Center of Evansville, said it is important for anyone who uses the Internet to be educated about cyber abuse.

"Education about using the Internet is a preventative measure to keep people safe," she said. "A number of victims' harassment has started with online relationships that could have been prevented."

USI and the Albion Fellows Bacon Center are presenting the workshops with support from several community partners.



## USI's Sparks facilitating program

The School of Nursing and Health Professions will present "Rethinking Alzheimer's: Assessing and Managing Alzheimer's Disease by Stage" Wednesday, October 30.

The program from 8 a.m. to 12:15 p.m. in Carter Hall will focus on assessment and management of persons with dementia of the Alzheimer's type with emphasis on day-to-day management strategies to prevent and manage clinical problems associated with the disease.

Dr. Martha Sparks, associate professor of nursing, will be the facilitator. Her clinical area is adult health with an emphasis on geriatrics and a specialization in Alzheimer's disease.

Her research focuses on geriatrics, including factors related to confusion in in-home and institutionalized elders, and her most recent study addresses patterns of Alzheimer's disease progression from the caregiver's perspective.

Sparks holds a PhD from University of Texas and joined USI in 1999. She is active in the national Gerontological Nursing Association, Home Healthcare Nurses Association, and Coalition of Advanced Practice Nurses of Indiana.



## Goya in Bordeaux opening film series

USI's fall 2002 Friday Night in the Forum film series will begin in November. Sponsored by the School of Liberal Arts, the series brings films to the big screen in their original 35 mm widescreen formats and in their original languages with subtitles.

Each free film will be shown at 7:30 p.m. in Forum I in the Byron C. Wright Administration Building. An informal discussion will follow.

### Friday Night in the Forum

- November 8 – *Goya in Bordeaux* (2000 Spain) Directed by Carlos Saura. Starring Francisco Rabal, Jose Coronado. A film about Goya in his 82nd year in exile in southern France, Saura's lushly photographed cross-media film is an innovative blend of cinema, theatre, and painting. Its stylization serves to dissolve the boundaries between the artist's turbulent life, his vivid imagination, and his wonderful paintings.

■ November 15 – *Mighty Aphrodite* (1995 U.S.) Directed by Woody Allen. Starring Mira Sorvino, Woody Allen. The film is a tongue-in-cheek classical Greek tragedy set in contemporary New York in which, years later, a successful upper-middle class adoptive father becomes obsessed with the identity of the real mother of his child.

■ November 22 – *Pollock* (2000 U.S.) Directed by Ed Harris. Starring Ed Harris, Marcia Gay Harden, Amy Madigan, Val Kilmer. Harris' directorial debut follows Pollock's life beginning in 1941, just before he meets Lee Krasner and spends time on Long Island producing his most famous works. The deceptively straightforward yet innovative film closely observes moments and gestures that seem to culminate in Pollock's giant action paintings.

■ December 6 – *Mulholland Dr.* (2001 U.S.) Directed by David Lynch. Starring Naomi Watts, Laura Elena Harring. The film offers a hypnotic, surreal story that intrigues but doesn't explain. For amnesiac, Rita, and Betty, the woman who helps her, the quest for identity in the city of popular dreams is difficult and confusing at best.

### Achievements

Four instructors in the English Department presented a panel session at the Thomas Watson Conference on Rhetoric and Composition October 10 at University of Louisville. The conference is a biennial international meeting of teachers from various disciplines who share the goal of "educating students to become critical, active, and engaged readers and writers." The theme was "Composing Identity," and each of the panelists presented an assignment to be used in various core curriculum composition courses:

- Leisa Belleau, instructor in English, presented a creative writing approach to help students understand various forms of identity crisis.
- Dr. Michael Given, instructor in English, explained an assignment that explores internalized sexual and gender assumptions.
- Martha Smith, instructor in English, considered changing societal values and their impact on student identities.
- Dr. Jean Wagner, instructor in composition, discussed the Freire model and the tactic of arguing against oneself to further an understanding of sexual orientation.

Jann Hickey, learning specialist in Academic Skills; Lori Suter, developmental educator in Academic Skills; and Deanna Odney, writing specialist in Academic Skills, presented at the National College Learning Center Association Conference October 3-4 in St. Louis. Hickey and Suter presented "Encouraging Students to Be Self-Motivated Toward Success," and Odney presented "Helping Students Become 'Re-viewers': Improving Reading Skills of Writers."

Eric Ramsey, program advisor in Student Development Programs, and Laurie Berry, assistant director of Residence Life, presented "Leading with Values" October 11 at the Indiana Student Affairs Association Conference at Butler University. Ramsey also served on the programming committee. Other USI attendees included Barry Schonberger, dean, Office of the Dean

of Students; Pam Hopson, director of the Multicultural Center; and Carrie Wilkerson, program advisor in the Multicultural Center.

Dr. Thomas M.
