UNIVERSITY OF SOUTHERN INDIANA  
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**IN MEMORY OF ALBERT A. WOLL.** The University community mourns the loss of a long-time friend, **Mr. Albert A. Woll**, Evansville business and civic leader who died Saturday, August 8, while on a trip to Boston. Mr. Woll's devotion to education had been a part of his daily life for 30 years, as he not only served on the administrative boards but enrolled in classes at USI to keep himself abreast of current thinking in his fields of interest and continually aware of University needs. Mr. Woll was a native of New York City who came to Evansville to live in 1951. As head of Woll Enterprises, Inc., he was an independent oil producer and farm manager. He became a member of the Evansville-Vanderburgh School Board in 1959 and was president of the board for two terms before leaving it in 1971. He was a student -- enrolled in an American Issues Forum -- when he was appointed in 1976 to the Indiana State University Board of Trustees and became a champion in the drive for separation that occurred in 1985. Mr. Woll then resigned from the ISU Board and was appointed by **Governor Robert D. Orr** as an honorary member of the new USI Board of Trustees.

USI President **David L. Rice** said, "Al Woll's death is a great loss to the University. He was a zealous proponent of higher education and worked for several decades to ensure that people of all ages and circumstances could avail themselves of excellent public education, from kindergarten through college. He was key to assuring the future of USI as a separate state university and always was mindful of the trust he was given in nurturing the development of this institution." **Dr. Joseph E. O'Daniel**, vice president of the USI Board of Trustees and, like Mr. Woll, a long-time official in the USI Foundation, said, "He's been a very loyal and faithful supporter of the University and will be missed. He was a major contributor to the development of the University."

Mr. Woll's family has established the Albert A. Woll Memorial Fund with the USI Foundation. Memorial contributions may be sent to the Development Office.
