ROBERT LAWSON, Dean of Students and Coordinator of Student Life, has co-authored an article which was recently accepted for publication in the Southern Quarterly, a publication of the University of Southern Mississippi. The article was entitled "The Emergence of Procedural Due Process in Higher Education."...DAVID L. RICE, President of Campus, addressed the fourth Community Leadership School, which concluded its recent nine week session with a graduation banquet on November 15. GUEST SPEAKERS

Earl H. Seibert, President of the Office Products and Commercial Sales Division of Smith and Butterfield, was guest speaker for the Records Management class on December 3, 1973. His topic was "Microfilming as a Records Management Tool." Rolland Eckels, Public Relations Director of Mead Johnson and Company, will be presenting his views of public relations and customer relations in the public relations class on December 7 at 1:00 p.m. Mr. Eckels will be in Room 196.

Dr. R. V. Schoder, of the Loyola University, Chicago, noted author, lecturer, and archaeologist, returns to ISUE on Friday, December 7 at 10:00 a.m. in Room 126 to present a critique of the views of Erich von Daniken on astronauts in ancient times and engage in free-wheeling discussion on archaeology in general. He recently appeared in a TV debate with von Daniken.

Thames and Hudson recently announced the publication of Dr. Schoder's latest book, Ancient Greece from the Air, featuring his own aerial photographs and commentaries. Dr. Schoder's other books are Masterpieces of Greek Art (featured by Book-of-the-Month-Club) and An Introduction to Homeric Greek. He has contributed numerous articles to scholarly journals.

He has visited the museums of the world in amassing his collection of 15,000 slides, which have appeared in over 130 books.

A scholar of international scope, he has addressed the Inter-American Classical Conference at Rio de Janeiro and the International Classical Conference at Bonn, Germany. Summer of 1972 found Dr. Schoder on an extensive tour of archaeological sites in Turkey, and last summer he headed a Loyola University archaeological mission at Antibes, France (ancient Antipolis).

Dr. Schoder is one of the founders of the Indiana Classical Conference and of the Vergilian Society and has been professor in residence at the American School in Athens.

The program is sponsored by the History Club of ISUE, and the general public is invited.

TRAINING OF PH.D.'S AS LIBRARIANS PLANNED

The Council on Library Resources said this week it has granted \$103,000 to the Graduate Library School of the University of Chicago to support postdoctoral fellowships to be offered over a two-year period beginning in June 1974. The fellowships will be awarded to persons with Ph.D.'s in fields other than librarianship for work toward the M.A. degree in librarianship at Chicago. Fellows will receive full tuition and stipends up to \$7,800, depending on need and number of dependents.

The program seeks to enlist candidates who have demonstrated high intellectual achievement in other fields and, if given the opportunity, would find a career in librarianship challenging and rewarding.

Applications for 1974-75 will be received up to February 1, 1974. Awards will be announced April 1, 1974. Interested candidates should apply to the Dean of Students, Graduate Library School, University of Chicago, 1100 East 57th Street, Chicago, Ill. 60637.
