USI PUBLISHES FIRST LITERARY MAGAZINE

The University of Southern Indiana has released the first edition of *The Southern Indiana Review*, a literary magazine featuring the works of USI faculty, staff, and graduate students and the faculty and students of the University's RopeWalk Writers Retreat, held the past seven years at Historic New Harmony.

This first volume was a joint project of the Master of Arts in Liberal Studies (MALS) program at USI and the RopeWalk participants. Ms. Karen Kopec, both a MALS and RopeWalk student, served as editor, assisted by other students in the two programs. Financial support came from a grant presented to RopeWalk last year by Mrs. Ruth Lilly of Indianapolis, and from the USI Graduate Studies Program.

Dr. Thomas Wilhelmus, associate dean of the School of Liberal Arts who served with Mr. Matthew Graham, associate professor of English, as advisors for the publication, called it a collection of "creative writing, intellectual history, and art -- an arts and sciences type publication." Included is *Ruining a Story*, a 10-page reminiscence by Mr. Michael Martone, Hoosier author, educator, and frequent RopeWalk participant.

Dr. Wilhelmus gave particular praise to the artistic and professional efforts of the USI Printing Services staff in the production of the magazine. He said the project was initiated as an annual magazine, but it will become a quarterly publication as it develops.

The Review is available at the USI Bookstore. Free copies were presented to contributors, while the general purchase price is \$6.

NEARLY \$16,000 AWARDED BY IAC

Four grants totaling nearly \$16,000 are being awarded to USI affiliates by the Indiana Arts Commission, supporting a variety of needs the agencies have in continuing their operation. The awards include:

New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art -- \$6,276 for costs associated with the eight exhibitions presented during the 1994-95 season

RopeWalk Writers Retreat -- \$2,239 to offer scholarships to and tape portions of the 7th annual retreat in Historic New Harmony

The New Harmony Theatre -- \$2,138

for artistic personnel costs associated with the summer season, and \$5,000 to assist in hiring an architectural firm for a needs assessment of Murphy Auditorium in order to improve accessibility

administrators, and leaders of religious, historical, and cultural agencies from across Indiana will attend. Resource personnel will be Ms. Christine Compston, director of the National History Education Network and the History Teaching Alliance, and Mr. Charles Haynes, director of the First Liberty Institute at George Mason University.

The workshop was organized by a statewide committee formed in early 1992 to explore the state of teaching and to learn the role that religious values and institutions have had in American history. The summer workshop evolved from a day-long January symposium at the Christian Theological Seminary in Indianapolis and will offer participants a chance to create a community-based model for teaching religious history in Indiana's schools. The model may be used nationwide.

The grants allow HSI to pay for workshop speakers' expenses, supplies, and publications, and participants' housing and meals. The planning committee is limiting the number of participants to 35.
