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Project e-AGLE receives \$100,000 boost

The University will use a \$100,000 grant from Lumina Foundation for Education to improve student retention and degree attainment on campus. The grant is one of nine awarded to public college campuses across the state.

The USI grant will support a program designed to ensure student success during the first years of college. According to ACT Inc. research, 60 percent of students at public institutions fail to complete degrees within five years; half of these students leave college during or just after their freshman year.

USI, as well as regional campuses of Indiana University and Purdue University, will each get a share of \$866,500 as part of a Lumina Foundation program called the President's Fund for Student Success in the First and Second Years of College program.

USI is using its grant to support Project e-AGLE (electronic advice for a great learning experience), a Web-based initiative targeting increased freshman retention and timely graduation.

“The University is truly excited about its new Project e-AGLE program. Use of the Web - students' preferred medium of communication - enables us to efficiently and effectively provide valuable nuggets of information that will guide new students through a successful first year,” said Dr. Rob Parrent, vice president for Student Affairs.

Project e-AGLE engages first-year students and their parents with an e-mail messaging system that provides information on a variety of topics. The project's Web-based information resources also offer additional alternative methods to find needed assistance.

“In addition, the new Impact Calling program that accompanies our deployed modules provides us with the opportunity to respond quickly to issues and concerns students and parents have in real-time. It has provided students with a unique opportunity to reach out, while informing parents about the freshman experience so they can, in turn, support their students' transition and success,” Parrent said.

The project is a collaborative effort of USI Academic Affairs, Student Affairs, Business Affairs, Foundation, and GoalQuest, a strategic enrollment management company.

Lumina Foundation invited the state's public baccalaureate and master's-level institutions to apply for grants to support programs that address the needs of students who face the greatest obstacles to degree attainment. These students may be low-income, first-generation college students, students of color, or adult learners.

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Former administrator MLK speaker

A local business leader, who is a former director of USI Student Financial Assistance, will be the keynote speaker of the University's 2004 Martin Luther King Jr. observance Monday, January 19.

W. Harold Calloway will make his presentation during “Remember! Celebrate! Act! A Day On... Not a Day Off.” The program will begin at 11 a.m. in Carter Hall.

A member of the USI administrative staff from 1973 to 1985, Calloway became a State Farm Insurance agent in Evansville in March 1985.

In that capacity, he has been recognized as a Life Honor Agent for 18 years and as a Legion of Honor Agent. He also is a 16-time qualifier for the Century Club and a 10-time qualifier for the Regional Vice President Club.

Before joining the University, he served as director of Evansville Head Start and as a caseworker in the Vanderburgh County Welfare Department.

A graduate of George Washington Carver High School in Philadelphia, Calloway holds a B.A. from Lane College in Tennessee and a master's from University of Evansville.

“Remember! Celebrate! Act! A Day On... Not a Day Off” also will include dance and musical performances by Designed By Grace, the USI gospel choir; Children's Center for Dance Education; Culver Elementary School, and Zion Missionary Baptist Church.

The USI Multicultural Center is sponsoring the program that is free and open to the public. A reception will follow.

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University adopts ethics code

The USI Board of Trustees has chosen to voluntarily comply with the spirit of the Sarbanes-Oxley Act of 2002 by creating and developing a standard Code of Ethics for University administrators, faculty, and support staff. The code was approved by the board at its January meeting.

According to the code, University administrators, faculty, and support staff should:

- » Comply with applicable governmental laws, rules, and regulations;
- » Act with competence and strive to advance competence, both in self and in others;
- » Devote time, thought, and study to the duties and responsibilities of one's job and be able to render effective and credible service;
- » Understand the University's objectives and policies, and contribute constructively to their ongoing evaluation and reformulation;
- » Maintain the confidentiality of privileged information that infringes upon another's right to privacy and not disclose information to secure personal or financial gain;
- » Complete the University's “Possible Conflict of Interest Disclosure Statement” to disclose any interest, financial or otherwise, direct or indirect, in any business, transaction, or professional activity which may be in substantial conflict with the proper discharge of one's duties;

- Refuse to accept any gift, favor, service, or other item of significant value from any person, group, private business, or public agency which may affect the impartial performance of one's duties; and
- Refuse to engage in actions that violate the ethical principles contained in this code or provisions of law

Prompt internal reporting of code violations should be reported through the appropriate departmental administrative personnel or to Human Resources and reviewed. Any issues pertaining to code violations would follow the same due process as outlined in the *University Handbook*.

USI embraces the values expressed in the code and advocates their observance by the members of the USI community.

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Leadership conference January 24

A motivational speaker, author, and training professional will facilitate "Leadership USI 2004: The Voice of Charisma," a four-hour interactive workshop, January 24.

A former subscriber to everyone else's definition of "having it all," Denney resigned from her administrative duties in higher education in 1993 to begin her own business, raise her own children, and live life according to her own priorities.

She is the author of *Life by Design: A Do-It-Yourself Approach for Achieving Happiness* and has appeared with Dr. Phil, on ABC and NBC morning shows in Chicago, and with financial advisor Suze Orman.

Before embarking on her speaking career, Denney served as assistant dean of students at Worcester Polytechnic Institute and as Program Board advisor at Case Western Reserve University. In 2002, she served as the featured speaker at USI's Connections II: Welcome Weekend.

She holds a B.A. in communication studies/psychology from Oswego State University and an M.A. in college student personnel from Bowling Green State University.

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Scholarship reflects senator's interests

Southern Indiana Higher Education Inc. has contributed \$15,000 to USI Foundation to establish a memorial scholarship honoring late state Sen. James R. Dick Harris, who died in September at age 74.

Harris had served on the USI Foundation Board of Directors and on the board of SIHE, the nonprofit organization that raised nearly \$1 million in a community fund drive to acquire the land for the campus of University of Southern Indiana and helped raise funds for initial student housing.

A geologist and owner of Dick Harris & Associates, Harris spent many years in public service, representing southwestern Indiana as a state senator from 1974 to 1986 during the period when USI was seeking independent status as a separate state university. Harris loved to reminisce from his legislator's viewpoint about the efforts it took to wage the successful campaign.

The James R. Dick Harris Memorial Scholarship for Geology will help attract top geology students with an expressed interest in applying geology in the fields of the environment, public policy, petroleum, or business, reflecting Harris' career.

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RopeWalk retreat in February

Two award-winning authors will lead USI's RopeWalk Winter Retreat February 27-29 in New Harmony, Ind.

Participants will have the opportunity to study short fiction/non-fiction with Lee Martin or poetry with Allison Joseph at the Barn Abbey, a rustic retreat center in the historic town.

Martin is the author of the recently released *Quakertown*, heralded by the *Washington Post* as "a consistently impressive and often dazzling new novel." He also wrote the acclaimed memoir, *From Our House*, and the short story collection, *The Least You Need to Know*. His next book, *Turning Bones*, will be part of University of Nebraska's American Lives Series.

A native of southern Illinois, Martin is an associate professor of English at Ohio State University. He previously was featured in the RopeWalk Reading Series and as the RopeWalk 2003 Hoosier Writer.

Joseph, a professor of creative writing at Southern Illinois University Carbondale, is the author of four collections of poetry: *What Keeps Us Here*, which won the 1992 Ampersand Press Women Poets Series Competition; *Soul Train; In Every Seam*; and *Imitation of Life*. In 2004, World Press will be publishing her next collection, *Worldly Pleasures*, winner of the 2003 World Press Poetry Prize.

Her work has appeared in numerous anthologies, including *American Poetry: The Next Generation*. She also is the editor of *Crab Orchard Review* and has appeared as a guest reader at the RopeWalk Writers Retreat and in the RopeWalk Reading Series.

The winter retreat fee is \$350, including the workshop, meals, and lodging at the Barn Abbey, or \$300 for the workshop and meals only. A nonrefundable registration fee of \$25 is due by Sunday, January 18, with the balance payable by February 2, which also is the manuscript deadline.
