The New Harmony Theatre

The New Harmony Theatre is presenting the final performances of the recent Broadway smash hit and Tony Award-winning musical *She Loves Me* through Sunday, June 29. Other 1997 productions will be Shakespeare's *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, July 11-27; the *Stardust* musical revue, August 1-17; and A.R. Gurney's comedy, *The Golden Age*, August 22-31.

Each production opens on a Friday night; performances will be at 7:30 p.m. Thursdays, 8 p.m. Fridays, 2 and 8 p.m. Saturdays, and 2 p.m. Sundays at Murphy Auditorium. Summer features include Thursday family nights (children 8 to 18, \$5, with an adult); Saturday matinee talk backs; and Sunday matinee "Magic Time," when cast and crew explain "how did they do that." Regular admission is \$14 - adults, \$13 - senior citizens (60-plus), and \$12 each - groups of 20 or more. The 11th annual production of the outdoor musical *Young Abe Lincoln* is under way at Lincoln Amphitheatre near Lincoln City, Indiana. The musical will be joined July 10 by the Rodgers and Hammerstein classic, *Oklahoma!* and the two outdoor musicals then will be presented on alternate nights until the season finale of *Young Abe* on Saturday, August 16.

A two-person exhibition featuring the works of Ms. Cathy Cooper Patterson, now of West Africa, and Mr. Dan Addington of Chicago will open with a reception for the artists from 1 to 4 p.m. Sunday, June 29, and continue through August 6 at the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art.

Ms. Cooper Patterson works primarily with mixed media, combining oils, pastels, pencil, and collage with crafted or found objects, and emphasizing development and exploration of a personal language and iconography. Mr. Addington's paintings include combinations of figurative or anatomical imagery, reflecting references to biology, romantic symbolism, and religious iconography.

Ms. Cooper Patterson received a B.A. in art from Eastern Illinois University and has traveled since, exhibiting in a variety of locations in the U.S. and abroad, including Algiers in 1992 and the American Embassy in Madrid in 1989. She now teaches at the International School of Ouagadougou in West Africa. Mr. Addington received an M.F.A. from Illinois State University and has been included in numerous group and solo exhibitions across the U.S. He is director of Gwenda Jay Gallery in Chicago.

Transfer students and the UCC: Advisors are reminded that transfer students who enter USI for the first time in or after the fall 1997 semester will be expected to use the University Core Curriculum as their general education program. Statements of this policy and this deadline have appeared in UCC guidebooks and in fall/spring/summer schedules for the past two years.

A policy adopted by the Faculty Senate this spring does have the effect of exempting transfer students from the Critical Thinking and Information Processing requirements of the UCC until a more viable approach to those categories can be found, but this policy does NOT delay implementation of the UCC itself.

Women's basketball 8th in attendance

The USI women's basketball team ranked eighth nationally in 1996-97 attendance for NCAA Division II. The Lady Screaming Eagles ranked tenth in 1995-96, while the Great Lakes Valley Conference -- made up of USI and 11 other colleges and universities in Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Missouri, and Wisconsin -- ranked seventh among Division II conferences for women's basketball attendance. The Lady Eagles were the only GLVC team to make the top 15.

The USI men's team fell in attendance from seventh in 1995-96 to 12th this past season, the first time the Eagles have been out of the top 10 since 1992-93. GLVC men's basketball ranked fifth nationally.
