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2 to graduate summa cum laude

Lectures, panel to focus on Mexico and NAFTA

A USI School of Liberal Arts Distinguished Scholar program will bring a University of Texas expert on Mexican history to USI to deliver a lecture and participate in a panel discussion on the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) as part of a year-long program on Mexico initiated by the Indiana Humanities Council.

Dr. Jonathan Brown will speak on "Labor and Free Trade in Mexico and Latin America: An Historical Perspective" at 7 p.m. Monday, April 24, in Mitchell Auditorium in the Health Professions Center.

A panel discussion, "After NAFTA: Indiana, Mexico, and the Impact of Free Trade," will include Dr. Brown and local panelists at 3 p.m. Tuesday, April 25, in Mitchell Auditorium. Panelists are Mr. Roy Mabrey of the Central Labor Council; Mr. Robert Griffin, president of Escalade, Inc.; Mr. Gerardo Osequera, contract engineer with Azteca Milling Company; and Dr. Alan Sandstrom of IU/PU-Fort Wayne, a specialist in the anthropology of Mexico. Ms. Catherine Blitzer of the Indiana Humanities Council will serve as moderator. Dr. Sandstrom also will speak in a School of Liberal Arts program at 1 p.m. Monday, April 24, in the Health Professions Center (HP1008).

Local organizers for the USI events are Dr. Casey Harison, assistant professor of history, extension 7150, and Dr. Oscar Ozete, chair for the Foreign Language Department, extension 1742. Mr. Michael K. Aakhus, associate professor of art, extension 1853, is coordinating Dr. Sandstrom's visit.

Petranek, Hartmann to receive top awards

USI's highest academic honors will be awarded this year to Dr. Charles F. Petranek, chair of the Sociology/Anthropology Department, selected by his colleagues to receive the National City Bank Distinguished Professor Award, and Mr. Chad J. Hartmann, a Presidential Scholar and mathematics major who was selected by the Student Academic Affairs Committee to receive the President's Medal, the highest award given a graduating senior. The awards will be presented at the USI Commencement on May 6.

Dr. Petranek was consistently described by students, colleagues, and students who have become colleagues as a teacher who truly enjoys his work, a man "with a warm heart, generous smile, and open office door...known by hundreds as a wise counselor and sympathetic friend." He was nominated by Dr. Donald E. Pitzer, chair of the History Department, and Dr. Melissa Vandevier, associate professor of nursing.

Dr. Pitzer explained he has worked closely with Dr. Petranek in University, professional, and community endeavors, noting Dr. Petranek "has pursued research projects into humane service for others through the United Way, Southwestern Mental Health Center, After-School Program for Children-at-Risk, Public Welfare Department, Day Care Centers, and more...he is an internationally-recognized pioneer in the use of simulated games to teach societal structure and behavior...he has made sacrificial personal efforts to involve his and others' students in the excitement of the broader world of scholarship..."

Dr. Vandevier said Dr. Petranek served on her dissertation committee and provided countless hours of help with statis-

tical analysis, a student support she found to be usual for him. In auditing one of his simulated games classes, she said he made the games a powerful learning experience. "I consider him a role model...with students. He is involved with every aspect of their learning environment and their personal welfare. His students become his friends and they grow together."

Dr. James R. Blevins, dean of the School of Liberal Arts, said Dr. Petranek's efforts as department chair prove him to be "a fine politician in the best sense of the term...Chuck shines as an excellent role model for students. He is a very strong family

man...(whose) instincts and intellect have fused. What works for him in his own life has become thoughtful academic theory."

Dr. Petranek earned a B.A. in sociology, psychology, and philosophy from Aquinas College, M.A. in sociology from Western Michigan University, and Ph.D. in sociology from Florida State University. He taught at Cleveland State University for three years, then joined the USI faculty in 1973 and has been chair of the Sociology/Anthropology Department since 1985.

He has directed evaluative research for numerous community organizations on such topics as priorities for the United Way, child/youth needs analyses including one on child abuse/neglect, client assessments of mental health facilities, and others. His publications in professional journals center on his work with the techniques of simulation and debriefing, but also reflect his involvement with hospice care on local, state, and national levels and the various community studies.

Mr. Hartmann, a 1991 graduate of Boonville High School where he was valedictorian of his graduating class, completed his studies at USI with a perfect 4.0 grade point average and will be one of two students who will graduate summa cum laude in 1995.

His candidacy for the President's Medal was supported by teachers who found his efforts in and out of the classroom to be remarkable. Dr. David W. Kinsey, chair of the Mathematics Department, said Mr. Hartmann's 4.0 GPA "is only partially indicative of his capacity for doing mathematics...he ranks in the top five percent of all the majors I have had the opportunity of working with the past (23) years." Citing his maturation in college, his assistance as a paper grader, and his work with various student organizations, Dr. Kinsey noted Mr. Hartmann "has exemplary personal qualities...almost unlimited potential..."

Mr. Hartmann will graduate with a minor in physics. Dr. Thomas J. Pickett, assistant professor of physics, said Mr. Hartmann's "preparation and background make him a truly exceptional student..." The two are completing a research project which Dr. Pickett said is ahead of schedule, primarily due to young Hartmann's effort, working

nights, weekends, and holidays to carry out intensive computer calculations. "The research should be, upon completion, of publishable quality," Dr. Pickett said, noting, "I think it will be some time before I have another research student like Chad."

Mr. Hartmann is a charter member of Mu Gamma Pi, the USI math club founded in 1991, and the Computer Science Club founded in 1994. He was 1992-93 president of the math club and is a board member for the computer club. He also is a member of the Student Education Association, the Kappa Delta Pi education honorary, the student group of the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics, and the Newman Club, which he has served as a board member. Ms. Christine Hoehn, director of Campus Ministry, citing Mr. Hartmann's work with the Newman Club and student housing groups, noted, "Chad is an excellent role model for young adults and the honest sharing of his gifts and talents benefits the entire University community."

Dr. Kinsey said he and colleagues have urged Hartmann to go on to graduate school but "he is genuinely interested in beginning his career as a secondary teacher of mathematics and physics."

Mr. Hartmann and his roommate, Mr. Brent Auberry, a political science and history

major, will be the summa graduates for this year's Commencement, having completed their college careers with perfect 4.0 GPAs.

Mr. Auberry also attended USI as a Presidential Scholar and was valedictorian at his graduation from Washington (Indiana) High School. He hopes to enter law school after his graduation from USI.

Mr. Auberry has served as the student member of the USI Board of Trustees the past two years, appointed by Governor Evan Bayh. He is a member of the Student Alumni Association, a resident assistant in student housing, and a student ambassador. He was one of five charter members in Pi Sigma Alpha, a political science honorary formed on campus in Fall 1994.

During his college career, he has been employed in University Printing Services, has held an internship in Vanderburgh Circuit Court, working with the Probation Department, and also worked as a summer intern in the southern Indiana office of former Congressman Frank McCloskey.

Steve Newton named USI athletic director

Mr. Steve Newton, a Terre Haute native who is assistant athletic director at the University of South Carolina, was named April 13 as the USI athletic director. He will assume duties on June 1.

USI President H. Ray Hoops, in announcing the appointment, said University officials were pleased with the range of candidates who applied for the post and especially pleased to have recruited someone with Mr. Newton's experience and ability. "He has a proven track record in athletic administration and fundraising," Dr. Hoops noted, "and will make an excellent addition for the USI staff."

Mr. Newton said he appreciates the confidence that President Hoops and the administration have shown in him and "I look forward to working with them toward our goals. Kathy and I and the family are ecstatic about joining the Evansville community and the USI family. You have a very positive environment, with strong leadership, successful programs, and a very supportive community."

Kathy is his wife, the former Kathleen Meyn of New Orleans. The Newtons have four children -- daughter LeAver of Las Vegas, and sons Harv, an Air Force Academy graduate who is an F-15 pilot; Jay, a pre-law junior at South Carolina; and Royce, 17.

Mr. Newton has been the assistant athletic director at South Carolina since 1993. He was head basketball coach there the two years prior, going to South Carolina from Murray State University in Kentucky where he was head coach (1985-91) and assistant athletic director (1988-91). He had joined the Murray staff as associate head coach in 1978.

Mr. Newton received his B.S. in physical education and M.S. in education from Indiana State University; he completed the 1994 Sports Management Institute in the Executive Management Program, University of Southern California. He was a Hoosier high school coach (1963-69) before moving into the college ranks and has been an assistant coach at Louisiana State in New Orleans (now University of New Orleans) and Mississippi State at Starkville.

His duties at South Carolina had included, among other tasks, acting as liaison to prepare for the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta, coordinating visits by international athletes and teams, budget development for special events, and fundraising for various departmental projects.

Shaw as an extension of an open-ended project from the 1994 fall genetics class. McConnell's presentation, entitled "Interspecies Conservation of the Nucleotide Reductase Gene," was done under a Student-Faculty Research and Creative Work Award to McConnell and Dr. Shaw.

Derrick Ohning presented a poster during the Undergraduate Research Poster Session at the 209th American Chemical Society National Meeting April 3. He presented results of research conducted with Bob Behme, a USI graduate; William Schlageter, another USI research student; and Dr. Marie Hankins, chair of the Physical Science Department.
