USI THEATRE: *Mad Forest*

USI Theatre will close its 1993-94 season in April with Caryl Churchill's *Mad Forest*, a unique exploration of the 1989 Romanian Revolution and the reign of Nicolae Ceausescu. *Mad Forest* is performed in three acts focusing on the lives of two ordinary families before, during, and after the revolution.

USI Theatre commissioned Nick Faust to direct Churchill's exploration of the revolution. Faust is a graduate of Webster University and received his M.F.A. from Tulane University. He has directed professional, university, and summer stock theatre across the country. The 31-member cast will be made up by 15 USI actors

handling multiple roles which depict the Vladu and Antonescu families, Ceausescu, and those around them.

The play will be presented at 8 p.m. Thursday-Saturday, April 7-8-9 and 14-15-16, and at 2 and 7 p.m. Sundays, April 10 and 17, at the USI Theatre, Barker and Igleheart avenues. Traffic alert - Weather permitting, the highway construction crew will place beams for the overpass over Indiana 62 at the USI entrance. A highway spokesperson explained 11 beams will be placed each day. A beam placement will require closure of highway

lanes for a minimum of 15 minutes. Once a beam is placed, affected lanes will be cleared of stopped traffic, then shut down again when they are ready for the next beam. The work will affect the eastbound lanes on Wednesday, and westbound lanes on Thursday, starting at 9 a.m. daily. UWE TIMM: 1994 ENLOW DISTINGUISHED SCHOLAR

A panel discussion involving University and U.S. and German political figures will be held at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, April 6, in the University Center as an introductory program for the visit the following week of German author and screenwriter Uwe Timm, the 1994 Enlow Distinguished Scholar. Timm currently is in Mexico, writing his seventh book.

The panel discussion on "Unification and the Rise of the German Right -- Implications for U.S.-German Relations" will feature:

- **Eighth District Rep. Frank McCloskey**, a member of the House Foreign Relations and House Armed Services committees who helped the University line up other panelists;
- **Mr. Christian Pauls**, political counselor with the German Embassy in Washington, D.C., who was involved in the Two-Plus-Four-Talks granting German reunification;
- **Mr. Greg Thielmann**, officer in charge of German affairs with the U.S. State Department in Washington, acting division chief of the Office of Strategic and Proliferation Affairs, and State Department advisor to the Geneva arms control negotiations;
- **Dr. Walter Rinderle**, German historian, author of *The Nazi Impact on a German Village*, National Endowment for the Humanities Fellow, and USI adjunct professor of history;
- **Dr. Walter Jermakowicz**, USI professor of management who has been an educator

in both East and West Germany and a former deputy minister of industry in his native Poland.

Dr. Donald S. Wolfe, USI associate professor of German who was a Fulbright Scholar and Grawe Meyer German Studies Fellow to Germany, will be the moderator. The discussion will end with a question/answer period, followed by a public reception.

The discussion will be one of a series of events preparing for Mr. Timm's visit. The first will be a **Rotary Club luncheon on Tuesday, April 5**, in which Dr. Wolfe will speak on "Unification: The Wall Within."

Two German films based on Mr. Timm's novels will be shown: *Der Flieger* (*The Flyer*), 7 p.m. Monday, April 11, Forum I, and *Kerbel's Flucht* (*Kerbel's Flight*), 7 p.m. Wednesday, April 13, West Side Branch Library, 2000 W. Franklin Street. Timm wrote the screenplay for both. In addition, the West German comedy *Men* will be shown at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, April 5, in Forum I as part of USI's spring film series. (*The Flyer* and *Men* will be shown with English subtitles; *Kerbel's Flight* will have the original German.)

Timm will present a public lecture, "Germany's Right Wing and the Challenge to Intellectuals," at 7 p.m. Thursday, April 14, in Forum I. A public reception will follow in the Orr Center.

On Friday, April 15, Timm will present a

second Enlow lecture at 10 a.m. in Forum III, this time dealing with his literary efforts. "When Writing Turns to Film" will be a discussion of converting his novels to screenplays. To date, five of his works have been redone as films and as a television series, with Timm doing all the screenwriting.

At noon Friday, visitors are invited to meet Timm at an informal, no-host luncheon in the UC Dining Room. At 1 p.m., he will be in the USI Bookstore to sign two of his latest novels, *The Snake Tree* and *The Headhunter*, both available in English translation.
