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## Toyota gives \$100,000 to Business and Engineering Center

**Shaun Koyama**, president of Toyota Motor Manufacturing, Indiana, Inc., (TMMI) presented a gift of \$100,000 to the University of Southern Indiana on January 23, 2008 in support of the instructional facilities for the soon-to-be constructed Business and Engineering Center. He made the presentation before an economics class which had been studying concepts used in the company.

"I'm proud to present this gift to the University of Southern Indiana so students benefit from the contribution," Koyama said.

USI President **H. Ray Hoops** accepted the generous gift saying, "USI's College of Business and Department of Engineering are partners in providing economic development, innovation, and entrepreneurship for the region. Of the 8,000 College of Business graduates, more than 5,000 reside within a 50-mile radius of Evansville. These USI alumni comprise a significant portion of the tri-state's managerial talent, and they enhance the southern Indiana communities where they live and work. We expect a similar impact from the engineering program, which graduated its second class in May 2007.

"Toyota's investment in the USI Business and Engineering Center will assist the University as it continues to produce qualified graduates with skills required in the contemporary workplace.

"The University is grateful to Toyota Motor Manufacturing, Indiana for our close association since TMMI came to southern Indiana. Thank you for visiting our campus today and thank you for this generous gift."

What the gift will fund will be determined at a future time.

Other Toyota representatives at the presentation included **R. J. Reynolds**, Toyota vice president of Administration at the Princeton, Indiana plant; **Laura Heck**, Public Affairs specialist, and **Connie Wellmeyer**, assistant general manager, Corporate Services.

The Business and Engineering Center will serve both business and engineering programs interdependently, providing both dedicated and shared classroom and laboratory space. The majority of the funding of the \$31.9 million building was approved by the 2007 General Assembly with \$2 million supplemental support raised by business and private contributions.

## USI sophomore studying in Thailand this semester

**Jessie Kessler**, a sophomore International Studies major at USI, is studying at Thammasat University in Bangkok, Thailand, this semester.

Kessler, the daughter of Mary and Brian Davis of Charlestown, Indiana and a 2006 graduate of Charlestown High School, applied for and was awarded a Freeman Award for Study in Asia, a nationally competitive scholarship.

The Freeman-ASIA scholarships are meant to increase the number of U.S. undergraduates who study in East and Southeast Asia. Award recipients are expected to share their experiences with their home campuses to encourage study abroad in East and Southeast Asia by others, and to spread greater understanding of Asian peoples and cultures within their home communities.

"I grew up in a small town but I always watched the travel channel," she said. "I loved to learn about people in other countries. One year we had an exchange student at our high school. I became friends with her and she taught me a lot about her culture. From then on I have always wanted to travel the world. Also, one of my hobbies is to learn languages."

Kessler arrived in Bangkok in January. She chose Thailand because she wanted to go to an Asian country where fewer Americans have studied. She doesn't speak Thai, but said, "Many people here speak enough English for me to get around pretty easily. I am taking a Thai Language class right now and I have made friends with some Thai students who speak English."

In addition to the language course, she is enrolled in Buddhist Institutions, Thai Rural Development, and Art History and Archaeology of Thailand this semester.

She said one of the most striking cultural differences is the method of greeting. "They don't shake hands. They do what is called a *wai*. It is when they put their hands together and bow their heads. This is not only a way to say hello, but the deeper you *wai* the more you show respect for the person to whom you are *waiing*."

At USI, Kessler worked in the International Programs and Services office, was involved in the International Club and Global Community, and volunteered with the English as a Second Language International program.

After graduation she hopes to volunteer with the Peace Corps and work for a non-governmental organization.

### Lawrence '73 to speak at Harmoniefest celebration

Historic New Harmony and Harmonie Associates will co-sponsor the annual Harmoniefest celebration Friday, February 15, at Thrall's Opera House. Harmoniefest is free to the public and will begin with a pitch-in dinner at 6:30 p.m. followed by a lecture at 7:30 p.m.

This year's celebration will feature a presentation on "German Medieval Manuscript Symbolism and the Harmonist Tradition," by **John M. Lawrence '73**, an international expert on ancient manuscripts. His presentation will include some of the earliest printed German Bible leaves and other illuminated manuscripts. He will draw on how the Lutheran Bible had a unique relationship to the Harmonists. Lawrence also will discuss how the relationship of the Harmonist printing tradition originated from the German tradition.

"Harmonie Associates is once again honored to co-sponsor this historic event and is honored to have Mr. Lawrence as the 2008 presenter," said **Dr. Martha Raske**, president of Harmonie Associates and USI associate professor of social work.

Harmoniefest celebrates the official founding of the Harmonie Society in 1805 and the date each year new members were invited to join the group. Members of the Society, led by George Rapp, founded what would become New Harmony in 1814.

Members serve on committees dealing with matters related to assessment, the curriculum, economic benefits, faculty affairs, faculty awards, faculty grievance and hearing, promotions, and student affairs.

### Graham is first featured reader in spring 2008 RopeWalk Reading Series

**Matthew Graham**, associate professor of English, will read his poetry at the first RopeWalk Reading of the spring 2008 semester Thursday, February 7.

Graham is the author of three books of poetry, *A World Without End* (2007), *1946* (1991), and *New World Architecture* (1985). He has received a number of awards and fellowships from the Academy of American Poets, the Indiana Arts Commission, and the Vermont Studio Center. He is USI's director of Creative Writing, co-directs the RopeWalk Writers Retreat, and serves as poetry editor for the University's literary magazine, *Southern Indiana Review*.

There will be two RopeWalk Readings during April, which is National Poetry Month.

On Tuesday, April 8, USI welcomes **Benjamin Percy**. Percy teaches creative writing, composition, and literature at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point. He is the author of the short story collections *Refresh, Refresh* (2007) and *The Language of Elk* (2006). Percy is the recipient of the 2007 Plimpton Prize, awarded annually by the editors of *The Paris Review*. He also received the Pushcart Prize Fellowship and the John Gardner Fellowship in Fiction from the Breadloaf Writer's Conference 2007.

The Sundance Institute accepted a screenplay based on his story *Refresh, Refresh* for its 2007 June Directors and Screenwriters Labs. His essay "Wal-Mart and the Apocalypse and Me" appeared in the 20th anniversary issue of the *Green*

He writes book reviews for *Esquire* and *The Capital Times* in Madison, Wisconsin. He received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Brown University and his Master of Fine Arts degree with a teaching fellowship from Southern Illinois University.

Two Louisville poets, **Nickole Brown** and **Dr. Lynnell Edwards**, take the RopeWalk podium on Thursday, April 24.

Brown's debut collection of poetry, *Sister*, was published by Red Hen Press in 2007. A poet and fiction writer, she has given a number of readings, including events in the early '90s with **Garrison Keillor** at New York's Waldorf Astoria and with **Gregory Corso** and **Allen Ginsberg** at New York University.

She serves as the program coordinator for Union Institute and University's summer writing residency in Slovenia and is the publicity consultant for the Palm Beach Poetry Festival. She has received grants from the Kentucky Foundation for Women and the Kentucky Arts Council.

Her work has been featured in *The Writer's Chronicle*, *Poets & Writers*, *Another Chicago Magazine*, *Diagram Magazine*, *32 Poems*, *The Cortland Review*, *Post Road*, *PP/FF*, *Florida Review*, *Chautauqua Literary Journal*, and Mammoth Books' *Sudden Stories* anthology. Her chapbook *mud* was published in 1996 by WhiteFields Press. She also co-edited the anthology *Air Fare: Stories, Poems, and Essays on Flight* (2004).

She holds a bachelor's degree from the University of Louisville and a Master of Fine Arts degree in creative writing from Vermont College. She studied English Literature at Oxford University as an English Speaking Union Scholar, and was the editorial assistant for the late **Hunter S. Thompson** in 1997.

Brown is director of marketing and development for Sarabande Books, a Louisville-based nonprofit literary press.

Edwards is the author of two collections of poetry, both from Red Hen Press: *The Highwayman's Wife* (2007) and *The Farmer's Daughter* (2003).

Her work has appeared in *Poets Against the War*; *Raising Our Voices: Oregon Poets Against the War*; and numerous literary journals including: *Poems & Plays*, *Southern Poetry Review*, *Poetry East*, and *Dos Passos Review*. She is a regular reviewer for *The Georgia Review*, *Pleiades*, and *Rain Taxi*.

She lives in Louisville, Kentucky where she teaches at the University of Louisville. She received her doctorate and Master of Arts degree in English at the University of Louisville and her undergraduate degree at Centre College in Danville, Kentucky. She is the recipient of a 2007 Al Smith Fellowship from the Kentucky Arts Council.

She also taught English at Bellarmine University in Louisville and for 10 years was a professor of English at Concordia University in Portland, Oregon, where she served as faculty advisor for the literary journal, *The Promethean*.
