**Nutrition Tips** (from *Vitality Digest*) - Palm oil is a highly saturated oil, so it should be avoided in a heart-healthy diet. Hearts of palm are another story. These good-for-you delicacies are cut from the interior of the palm tree and only contain a trace of fat and a large amount of beta carotene.

**Salad talk** - Many of our favorite dressings are packed with calories and fat. Two tablespoons of ranch dressing has 109 calories, 92 percent fat; Italian, 137 calories, 91 percent fat; Russian, 151 calories, 90 percent fat; French, 134 calories, 84 percent fat; and thousand island, 118 calories; 83 percent fat. Better choices: two tablespoons of nonfat yogurt only has 16 calories, 3 percent fat; flavored, low-fat yogurt, 29 calories, 9 percent fat; and plain low-fat yogurt, 18 calories, 22 percent fat.

If you're trying to cut back on sugar, read the product labels of foods before you buy them. If any of these words appear first on a label, you know the product has a large amount of sugar: glucose, maltose, dextrose, lactose, fructose, or syrup.

When you get the munchies, try any of these low-calorie snacks: one-half of a small cantaloupe, 48 calories; a medium kiwi fruit, 48 calories; medium peach, 38 calories; or medium tangerine, 35 calories.

Eat healthy at parties by filling your plate first with low-fat items — vegetables, salads, whole wheat bread. If you fill up on healthy items first, you'll be less tempted by high-fat foods.
