The songs range from the hilarious "Make 'em Laugh" to the delicate "You Were Meant for Me" and the show-stopping classic "Singin' in the Rain" solo by Kelly.

HISTORIC COMMUNAL SOCIETIES CONFERENCE

Thursday-Sunday, -- The USI Center for Communal Studies will hold the 14th annual Historic Communal Societies Conference at the restored 19th century Swedish settlement of Bishop Hill in northern Illinois. New Harmony, the Shakers, Hutterites, Mormons, Oneidans, Icarians, Hare Krishnas, and kibbutzim will be the focus of sessions in which 45 speakers from the U. S. and Israel will address the theme, "Immigrant and Native Communitarians: Ethnicity, Ideology, and Material Culture." Among featured events will be a guided tour of Bishop Hill by a community descendant, Swedish music, and an authentic five-round Swedish smorgasbord.
