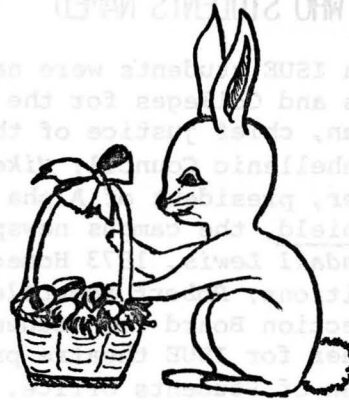

Charles T. Barber, Assistant Professor of Political Science, attended the International Studies Association convention in St. Louis last month and was appointed to serve during 1974-75 on the General Committee of the International Law Section.

The International Studies Association has ten different specialist sections. The International Law section appoints eight specialists in international law from different regions of the country and has them keep record of what is going on within the section by correspondence and communication with the other members. In this way, recommendations for preparation of the convention for the coming year are made. The 1975 convention location has been set for Philadelphia.

VIEWPOINT

The following comments were made by panel members on the Symposium on Aged held on campus April 1, 1974.

"When young people think of Social Security, they usually think of old couples sitting on porches in rocking chairs. They fail to realize the many thousands of benefits made to survivors in case of death or disability. In a school this size, I would say there are many students here drawing benefits from deceased or disabled parents. You should think of social security as a basic floor on which to plan your insurance and retirement program."

Behrman, "Amphitryon 38" will be presented at the ISUE Playhouse on April 19, 20, 21 and April 26, 27 and 28 at 8:00 p.m. The three-act comedy, directed by Clayton Crenshaw, has leading characters portrayed by Susan Lynn as Alkmena, Tom Angermeier as Amphitryon, John Hertweck as Jupiter and Rick Ivie as Mercury.

"Amphitryon 38" follows outline of the legend of Amphitryon, Alkmena and Jupiter in which Jupiter descends to earth to make love to Alkmena, but is met with stubborn resistance because Alkmena is faithful to her husband. EASTER FILMSTRIP

DEADLINE FOR REQUISITIONS TO BE CHARGED AGAINST 1973-74 BUDGET

The Purchasing Department will accept requisitions for the 1973-74 fiscal year until the following dates:

Bid and Written Quotation Items - May 10, 1974

- A. Bid Items or items which total \$5,000 or more
- B. Written quotation items or items which total \$300-\$4,999

Requisitions for Other Items - May 31, 1974

These deadlines are necessary to allow the Purchasing Department enough time to complete the processing of the requisition and issue the purchase orders. All requisitions received after June 1, 1974, will be charged to the 1974-75 budget. The purchase orders for these requisitions received after June 1 will be distributed to the departments and vendors on or after July 1, 1974.

If anything is being planned which cannot meet the deadlines, please contact the Purchasing Department immediately.

CHANGE IN TRAVEL REGULATIONS

Effective with travel on and after April 1, 1974, ISUE employees will be reimbursed at the rate of 12¢ per mile when using their personal auto for university approved travel.

Also, as of the same date, the charge back for university automobiles will be 12¢ per mile, 15¢ per mile for vans and 25¢ per mile for the two-ton truck.
