



USI CAREER WEEK FEATURES ALUMNI

The School of Business fall Executive-In-Residence program on Wednesday, October 23, will be one of several programs in which alumni will be featured during Career Week, October 21-25.

Mr. Michael K. Campbell, an accounting graduate and CPA who is senior vice-president and chief financial officer of Hurco Companies, Inc., and president of Hurco Manufacturing Company, will be executive-in-residence. He will lead discussion sessions at 10 a.m. on the topic "One of the Best Corporate Turnarounds in Indiana's History -- The Story of Hurco," and 11 a.m., "The Importance of World-Class Manufacturing in America and Competing in International Markets," and speak at a noon luncheon on "Operation Industrial Storm," all in the University Conference Center. There also will be roundtable meetings with students.

The discussions and luncheon are open to the public. The discussions are free; luncheon reservations are \$10 per person and may be made by calling extension 1718 by Friday, October 18.

Hurco -- based in Indianapolis, with manufacturing facilities in Michigan, England, and West Germany -- is a manufacturer and marketer of numerically controlled machine tools. The company was incorporated in 1968 and has been a pioneer in the innovation and application of microprocessor technology to specialized machine tools, controls, and accessories. Mr. Campbell crafted the original turnaround plan for Hurco and has served in senior management positions during the implementation of this strategy. He has negotiated the acquisition of key business units, has served on the board of all international subsidiaries of Hurco Companies, Inc., and has been responsible for the strategy and implementation of the value engineering program which has resulted in the achievement of one of the highest gross margins in the machine tool industry.

Career Week will open Monday, October 21, with a day-long program by **Ms. Ann Marie Sabath** on Business Etiquette, sponsored by the Inter-Business Council and the School of Business. Ms. Sabath is the founder of At Ease, Inc. She has developed training programs focusing on business etiquette that include a popular board game, "Mind Your Manners," introduced to the retail market at the 1987 Hong Kong Toy Show.
