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USI FOUNDATION TOPS \$2 MILLION IN ASSETS; ELECTS OFFICERS. The USI Foundation went over \$2 million in April in total assets set aside to support scholarships and activities at the University, a 58 percent increase in the four years since USI became a separate state institution. The total includes \$13 million dedicated to scholarships, with the growth providing the ability to support 319 awards valued at \$191,919 for the 1988-89 academic year -- a 75 percent increase in awards over 1987-88 and a 230 percent increase for the four-year period. Several bylaw changes have been approved, including naming Mrs. Suzanne A. Nicholson, USI Development director, as president of the Foundation. Other changes included strengthening the USI Alumni Association's affiliation by making Mr. John Schutz, Evansville investment broker and incoming alumni president, a vice chairman on the Executive Committee and providing ex officio board membership to the association's president-elect, current president, and immediate past president. The other two foundation vice chairmen -- Mr. Ted C. Ziemer, Jr., Evansville attorney, and Mr. Rolland Eckels, director of Public Affairs, Bristol-Myers USPNG -- were assigned specific duties and will supervise development and planning activities, respectively.

Mr. C. Wayne Worthington, Evansville banker, was elected chairman of the Foundation Board. Taking office with him and the three vice chairmen on July 1 will be Mrs. Bettye B. McCutchan, Evansville civic leader, secretary; Mr. Richard A. Schlottman, Evansville banker, treasurer; Mr. Byron C. Wright, USI vice president for Business Affairs, assistant treasurer; and Dr. David L. Rice, USI president, and Mrs. Sherrianne M. Standley, USI vice president for University Relations, administrative advisors. Ms. Margaret Henderson Blair, president of Research Systems, Inc., was elected to a three-year term on the Foundation board.

1989-90 PRESIDENTIAL SCHOLARSHIP WINNERS. Sixteen Hoosier high school valedictorians and salutatorians have enrolled at the University of Southern Indiana for the 1989-90 fall term and will be recipients of the prestigious Presidential Scholarships which guarantee up to \$18,400 to cover tuition, books, fees, and room and board during four years at the University. The scholarships, inaugurated by the USI Foundation in 1988 to attract top students to USI, allow recipients up to \$4,600 a year and are renewable through four years if the student continues to meet established criteria. An additional qualification has been added for 1989-90 and later recipients, requiring scores of at least 1000 on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT). The 1989-90 recipients include:

HISTORIC SOUTHERN INDIANA FACULTY ANNOUNCED. Faculty members for Historic Southern Indiana Project's two-year program of studying the national and international significance of southern Indiana historic sites have been announced by Dr. Darrel E. Bigham, HSIP director and USI history professor. In addition to Dr. Bigham, they will be: Dr. Donald Carmony, emeritus professor of history at Indiana University, author of books about Indiana history, and former editor of Indiana Magazine of History; Dr. Paul Lucas, IU professor of history and specialist in colonial America who offers an American history course designed for prospective teachers; Dr. Peter Onuf, professor of history at Southern Methodist University whose published works deal with eighteenth century America; Dr. John J. Patrick, IU professor of education and director of the Social Studies Development Center and author of seven elementary and secondary textbooks and a teacher's guide for study of the Northwest Ordinance; and Ms. Marjorie Jones, USI special part-time lecturer in anthropology and Spanish who has extensive field work in anthropology and is a former president of Friends of Angel Mounds, the historic Indian site east of Evansville. The project, "Indiana and the New Nation, 1776-1876," has been funded by a \$272,000 grant from the Education Division of the National Endowment for the Humanities. It will offer two summer institutes (July 10-28, 1989, and July 9-27, 1990) and four fall and winter seminars to the 30 Indiana teachers selected to participate.
