UNITED WAY CAMPAIGN. The 1988-89 United Way campaign was launched Tuesday, October 4, on the USI campus with a goal of \$15,000, a 16 percent increase over last year's outstanding fund drive. The USI United Way Campaign Committee, representing 14 campus divisions, has organized several competitions to help boost the campaign. Three "traveling trophies" will be awarded for the second year to: the division with the highest percentage of employees giving, the division with the highest percentage of Fair Share giving, and the division with the highest per capita giving. In addition, any division where all employees make United Way pledges will receive a plaque congratulating them for "100 Percent Commitment to United Way."

Emphasis again is placed on the Fair Share gift, a pledge which represents one half of one percent (.005) of pre-tax income. Last year, 52 employees pledged Fair Share contributions, a 25 percent increase over the previous year. The campaign committee offers an incentive package called the USI Fair Share Lottery, with the following prizes -- faculty, \$100 travel stipend; administration, choice of \$100 travel stipend or extra vacation day; and support staff, extra vacation day.

Someone who works with you will be your United Way division coordinator and will solicit your pledge personally during the next two weeks. Your coordinator will be prepared to show you how your division measured up last year. **Dr. Aldo F. Cardarelli**, professor of education, is campaign chairman. **Mr. Michael W. Whipple**, manager of accounting services, is co-chairman. **Mrs. Suzanne Nicholson**, director of Development, is campaign advisor.

NEW HARMONY GALLERY. Two artists are being featured during October at the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art. Small works on paper from the Alhambra Series of **Mr. John Hubbard** of Dorset, England, will be shown through October 31 and Mr. Hubbard will be artist-in-residence during the month in New Harmony, sponsored by the Blaffer Trust. His October work will be featured in a full-scale exhibition in May, 1989. Mr. Hubbard has shown with Fischer Fine Art in London and Bernard Jacobson Gallery in New York. He currently is showing with **Mr. Terry Goodman** in New York and is in permanent collections in London's Tate Gallery and Victoria and Albert Museum.

On Sunday, October 9, a reception will be held from 1 to 4 p.m. at the Gallery for **Mr. Stephen Lloyd Herron**, a 1981 USI graduate from Rockport, Indiana, who now works in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. In "Agrosculpture," Mr. Herron will show sculpture made from a variety of materials, telling stories of farms in southern Indiana and the bayous of the South. Mr. Herron completed an MFA with a concentration in ceramics in 1983 at Washington University, St. Louis. In 1984, he moved to Beaumont, Texas,

where he helped form the Artist's Studio, Inc., a non-profit studio/gallery cooperative where he also was an artist-in-residence. He has been a visiting artist at Louisiana State, Lamar, and Washington universities, and has shown extensively in Texas and Louisiana. His work will be on display at the New Harmony Gallery through November 15.

"PARTNERS FOR SUCCESS." The second program in the "Partners for Success" series sponsored by the Southern Indiana Labor-Management Education Forum will feature the Midwest Division of National Steel at Portage, Indiana. **Mr. Robert Pastor**, president of Local 6103 United Steel Workers of America, and **Mr. Gale Orr**, director of human resources, Midwest Division, will be presenters for the program at 8 a.m. Wednesday, October 12, in the University Center. The steel officials will discuss how they developed their Partnership Cooperative agreement, which includes unprecedented information sharing techniques, cooperative problem solving at all levels, changes in work rules to ensure productivity improvements, and a firm commitment to employment security. Through a contracting-out agreement, work was redesigned, jobs restructured, and work assignments were varied to keep as much work in the plant as possible. The result is that National Steel is a surviving and prospering company in a very competitive market place.

Mr. Timothy B. Mahoney, forum director, said the degree of interest in employee participation became evident when more than 90 Tri-State labor and management representatives attended the first session presented in September by a representative of the Ford plant in Louisville, Kentucky. NEW YORK ARTIST TO BE FEATURED. **Ms. Katharine T. Carter**, exhibiting painter and active participant in the New York art scene, will be a visiting artist lecturer Thursday, October 13, at the University and in New Harmony. Her visit, sponsored by the USI Art Department and the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art, will be a unique opportunity for anyone who does not have regular, first-hand contact with galleries and museums in New York City to learn of innovations that reshape contemporary American art. Ms. Carter, in an annually updated slide lecture, "Highlights of the New York Art Season," will give a comprehensive overview of the 1987-88 season at 7:30 p.m. October 13 at The Atheneum in New Harmony. A reception will follow at the New Harmony Gallery. Ms. Carter also will present a lecture-workshop, "How To Professionally Approach the New York Galleries," from 2 to 4 p.m. October 13 in Forum III at USI. This program for students and other artists examines every aspect of competing professionally in the art exhibition and gallery market. All programs are free and open to the public. USI TO HOST CONFERENCE FOR PSYCHOLOGY TEACHERS. The fifth Mid-America Conference for Teachers of Psychology will be held Friday and Saturday, October 14-15, in the University Center. The sessions will close around noon Saturday with a presentation of the popular "Psych Follies" by the USI Psi Chi Chapter, National Psychology Honorary. **Dr. Joseph J. Palladino**, chairman of the USI Psychology Department, is coordinating the annual program. Among featured speakers on the "Commitment to Excellence" program will be:

Dr. Howard Pollio of the University of Tennessee, a Distinguished Research Professor, former National Phi Beta Kappa lecturer, author of several books including

an introductory psychology textbook, and co-author of "Making Sense of College Grades." The title of his presentation will be "Making the Familiar Strange: Teaching Consciousness to Undergraduates."

* **Dr. Robert S. Daniel** of the University of Missouri, founding editor of the journal, *Teaching of Psychology*, and recipient of the Distinguished Service Award from the American Psychological Association Division on Teaching, the AMOCO Teaching Award, and the American Psychological Foundation Contribution to Teaching Award. His presentation title is be "Sex, Sin, and Shame."

* **Dr. Stephen Davis** of Emporia State College, president-elect of the APA Division on Teaching, most recent recipient of the APF Contribution to Teaching Award, and a consulting editor to *Teaching of Psychology*.
