ADMINISTRATION

University of Southern Indiana

H. Ray Hoops, President



H. Ray Hoops became the second president of the University of Southern Indiana in July 1994. During his tenure, he has forged important community partnerships and has overseen dramatic growth in the University's enrollment, facilities, and academic programs.

A native of Illinois, Dr. Hoops received his undergraduate degree from Eastern Illinois University and master's and doctoral degrees in Audiology and Speech Sciences from

Purdue University. He also completed an M.B.A. at Moorhead State University.

His career as a scientist and educator has included a faculty appointment jointly at the University of Michigan and Wayne State University.

He published extensively and was nationally recognized for his contributions in the areas of rehabilitation of post-surgical patients with cancer of the larynx and in the analysis of language dynamics resulting from brain damage. Among his numerous publications in a variety of behavioral and medical journals was the report on a study which received the National Research Award, the highest honor of the American Speech and Hearing Association. Dr. Hoops also was named Fellow of the Association.

His administrative appointments included the directorship of the Division of Marketing in the U.S. Department of Health, Education,

and Welfare. He received two national service awards for that work. He also was a Senior Fulbright-Hayes Research Scholar in the College of Medicine at the University of the Philippines. Other appointments included dean of the Graduate College of the University of Northern Iowa, associate vice chancellor for Academic Affairs for the Oregon State System of Higher Education, vice president for Academic Affairs at North Dakota State University, and president of South Dakota State University.

In the six years prior to becoming the president of the University of Southern Indiana, Dr. Hoops served as the vice chancellor for Academic Affairs at the University of Mississippi. While at Ole Miss, Dr. Hoops received the National Council of State Governments Association Award for his pioneering work on Project '95, a blueprint for the reform of education in the state of Mississippi. He also received the Peterson's Guide Award for contributions to the education of minority students in the innovative and highly successful graduate participation initiative.

President Hoops serves on the Deaconess Hospital Board of Directors, the Welborn Foundation Board of Directors, the Metropolitan Evansville Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors, and the WNIN Board of Directors. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities and serves as the chair of the Indiana Conference of Higher Education.

Jon Mark Hall, Director of Athletics



Jon Mark Hall was appointed to the position of director of Athletics in January 2002. He moved into the position after spending seven years as the assistant director of athletics. He is the second director of athletics that USI has had.

Under his direction, USI was the 2003-04 GLVC All-Sports and Commissioner's Cup winner and is the host of the 2004 NCAA Division II Cross Country national championships.

In addition to his duties as director of athletics, Hall also is the chair of the NCAA Division II men's and women's tennis committee. He has served on the Great Lakes Valley Conference Executive Committee and the NCAA II Great Lakes Regional women's basketball committee.

Hall joined the USI Athletic Department in 1995 as an assistant athletic director and men's tennis coach.

As the men's tennis coach, no one did it better in the GLVC than Hall. He was named the GLVC Coach of the Year five times, directed the Screaming Eagles to four GLVC regular season titles and GLVC Tournament crowns and set a 123-47 record (.724).

During his final season as head coach, Hall led the Eagles to their third straight appearance in the NCAA II Tournament and their first victory

in the post-season. In 2000 and 2001, Hall put the Eagles on the national map with their first two invitations to the NCAA II Tournament in the 27-year history of the program.

Hall came to USI after a tenure at the University of South Carolina-Spartanburg as an assistant athletic director, where he was the NCAA compliance coordinator, oversaw the academic support service program for student athletes, and coordinated the Athletes Can Educate (ACE) program. He also assisted in fundraising and promotion activities.

The native of Murray, Kentucky, is a 1990 *cum laude* graduate of Murray State University, with a bachelor's degree in business administration. While at MSU, Hall was on the tennis team for two seasons, earning Academic All-Ohio Valley Conference honors in 1987. Hall received his master's degree in sports administration from Ohio State University in 1992.

In 1998-99, he completed the Sports Management Institute Executive Program at the University of South Carolina and the University of Notre Dame.

Hall and his wife Patti reside in Evansville and have two sons, Nathan and Garland, and daughter Mary Claire.



A meal plan is available in the University Center. More than 3,000 students live on campus.

USI is the most affordable four-year institution in the state of Indiana, and some families find that they can handle the cost of a USI education without financial aid. Many others qualify for need-based financial aid packages, including grants, loans, and jobs.


EVANSVILLE, Indiana**...A CITY with urban attractions and hometown friendliness**

Situated on the banks of the Ohio River, Evansville is a mid-sized city that welcomes USI students and offers them plenty of things to do. Roberts Stadium and the Victory Theatre attract students to concerts by entertainers like Nelly, Aerosmith, Kenny Chesney, Kid Rock, and Josh Groban. Traveling Broadway shows and feature performances come to The Centre. For a relaxing walk or invigorating run, the downtown riverfront features a greenway with a wonderful view of the changing river traffic and the Evansville skyline. Movie theatres (including an IMAX) and Swonder Ice Arena draw students together for fun, activity, and fellowship. Evansville's coffee shops, restaurants, and shopping areas also are places where students like to spend time. SEASON OUTLOOK

2005-06 Men's Basketball



The University of Southern Indiana men's basketball team enters the 2005-06 season as it never has before—the defending GLVC regular-season and tournament champions.

In their fourth season under Head Coach **Rick Herdes**, the Screaming Eagles won the program's ninth conference regular season crown and their first league tournament title on their way to posting a 27-5 overall record. Herdes' Eagles also reached the NCAA Division II Tournament for the 12th time in 13 years and was ranked number one nationally for the eighth time in the last 12 years.

The 27 victories mark the 13th straight season that USI has reached 20 or more wins and the 10th time since 1992-93 that the Eagles have reached the 25-win plateau. USI ranks seventh among Division I, II, and III programs in victories, averaging over 25 wins a year in the last 13 seasons.

In addition to defending their GLVC championship, the Eagles will have to contend with changes within the league. The GLVC has expanded to 14 teams and has been split into divisions with

USI being placed in the West Division. The West also includes Drury University, the University of Missouri-Rolla, the University of Missouri-St. Louis, Quincy University, Rockhurst University, and Southern Illinois University Edwardsville.

Senior guard **David Bryant** averaged 8.7 ppg and 3.4 apg and was named to the All-GLVC in his first year at USI.

USI will play each team in the division twice, while playing each team

from the East Division—Bellarmine University, the University of Indianapolis, Kentucky Wesleyan College, Lewis University, Northern Kentucky University, Saint Joseph's College, and the University of Wisconsin-Parkside—once.

Herdes, who is 102-27 since taking over the Eagle program in 2001-02, will lean heavily upon six returning players. Three of the returners were honorable mention All-GLVC players in 2004-05.

In the frontcourt, senior forward **Chris Thompson** and junior forward **Geoff Van Winkle** lead the way.

Thompson is USI's top returning scorer after nearly averaging a double-double as a junior. He was second on the team in scoring with 11.3 ppg and was third in the GLVC with a team-high 9.2 rpg. Thompson also produced a team-high 12 double-doubles and 15 double-figure rebound games.

Van Winkle started the final 24 games of 2004-05 and was fifth on the team in scoring, recording 9.3 ppg. He posted a team-high 75 three-point field goals as a


sophomore and has hit 147 long-range bombs in just two seasons.

The Eagles also will look for increased contributions from sophomore forward **John Hoover**. Hoover played in 29 games off the bench as a freshman, averaging 2.4 ppg and 1.6 rpg.

To replace the loss of last year's starters, Randy Holbrook and Reque Newsome, the USI coaching staff has brought in six newcomers—junior forwards **Nick Brooks**, **Keith Christmas**, and **Marty Wise**; freshman forward/center **Mike Harrington**; and freshmen forwards **George Cunningham** and **Mike Kalicak**.

Wise was named third team NJCAA All-American in 2004-05, averaging 13.0 points, 8.0 rebounds, 4.0 assists, and 2.0 steals as a sophomore at Moberly Area Community College. MACC was 30-7 overall and was the NJCAA Division I runner-up in 2004-05.

Brooks transferred to USI after two seasons at Butler University where he averaged 5.0 ppg and 2.3 rpg in 52 appearances for the Bulldogs. He also had 14 starts, 12 last season.



Senior guard **Danny Gibson** showed explosive potential as a junior, especially in the GLVC Tournament where he averaged 7.0 ppg.

SCHS was ranked as high as 21st nationally in the USA Today High School Top 25 and defeated number-one ranked St. Anthony's High School, coached by former Duke All-American Bobby Hurley.

The 6-foot-7 forward was named first team San Diego California Interscholastic Federation Division II All-Grossmont Conference in March. He also was a first team CIF All-Academic performer in 2004.

Brooks was the Bulldog's top scoring freshman with 4.5 ppg in 29 games and posted a career-high 21 points in 21 minutes against Youngstown State University. He also grabbed 1.9 rpg and sank 20 three-point field goals in 2003-04.

In 2004-05, Brooks saw action in 23 of the 28 Butler contests and averaged a

collegiate best 5.7 ppg and 2.8 rpg. He shot 47.5 percent from the field (48-101) and ranked second on the team in blocked shots and fifth on the team in steals.

Christmas transferred to USI after two seasons at Middle Tennessee State University where he averaged 1.7 ppg and 1.1 rpg in 33 games. He averaged 14 ppg and 12 rpg as a senior at West Side High School in Gary, Indiana.

Cunningham will begin his collegiate career at USI after averaging 16.4 points and 12.6 rebounds per game for Steele Canyon High School in Spring Valley, California. The 6-foot-7 forward was named first team San Diego California Interscholastic Federation Division II All-Grossmont Conference in March. He also was a first team CIF All-Academic performer in 2004.

Harrington is USI's top candidate to fill the post position.

Harrington, who transfers to USI from California State University-Fullerton, was a three-year standout at Rich Central High School (Olympia Fields, Illinois). He averaged 11.0 ppg and 9.0 rpg as a senior and helped RCHS to a 20-9 record in 2003-04.

Kalicak attended the University of Missouri last year, but did not compete. He was an All-State and All-Conference performer at Desmet Jesuit High School (St. Louis, Missouri) where he averaged 15 points and six rebounds per game as a senior.

In the backcourt, the Eagles will have to replace All-GLVC performer Cris Brunson. Brunson finished his four-year career ranked number one in three-point field goals made and fourth in scoring.

USI will look to senior guards **David Bryant** and **Danny Gibson** to pick up the slack from Brunson's departure. Bryant, who was honorable mention All-GLVC, was second on the team with 3.4 assists per game while ranking sixth on the squad with 8.7 ppg. Gibson averaged 4.3 ppg as a junior, but posted 6.4 ppg during the GLVC and NCAA II Tournament.

Junior **Melvin Hall** and freshman **Alex Gravelle** are new to the backcourt in 2005-06.

Hall transferred to USI from John A. Logan College after averaging 19.0 ppg during his two-year career. He posted 18 ppg and was named third team All-American last year. The Great Rivers Athletic Conference Freshman of the Year also averaged 20.0 ppg in 2003-04.

Prior to attending John A. Logan, Hall was the 2002-03 *Evansville Courier & Press* Player of the Year while playing for Harrison High School. He averaged 21.0 ppg and shot 85 percent from the line as a senior at HHS.

Gravelle was a four-year varsity performer at Louisville Male High School. He posted 13.9 ppg and 5.2 assists as a senior after

posting 14.5 ppg and 4.2 assists as a junior.

USI opens the 2005-06 campaign with a pair of exhibition games, sandwiched around the Disney Division II Tip-Off Classic.

The first exhibition game will be at the University of Tennessee, directed by former USI Head Coach Bruce Pearl, on November 3. This will be the second time Herdes' Eagles have taken on their former coach.

Following the exhibition opener, the Eagles move further south to play in Disney's Division II Tip-off Classic November 11-13.

USI concludes the preseason with an exhibition game at the University of Louisville on November 20.

The home opener at the Physical Activities Center will be November 22 when the Eagles host Robert Morris College to begin a three-game homestand. USI concludes its first homestand of the year by hosting the USI Invitational November 25-26, featuring Bellarmine University, Central State University, and Glenville State College.

The Eagles start the conference schedule on the road at Missouri-Rolla December 1, and begin league action at the PAC by hosting the University of Wisconsin-Parkside December 8.

The highlights of the USI games with the East Division are on the road when the Eagles play at Northern Kentucky University January 7 and at Kentucky Wesleyan College on February 4. USI will host the University of Indianapolis January 26.



USI Head Coach Herdes



Rick Herdes (Noble, Illinois) has USI basketball fans looking forward to each March. Herdes has steered the Screaming Eagles to three straight NCAA Division II Tournament appearances and a 102-27 (.791) overall record during his four years.

In 2004-05, Herdes' Eagles won the programs first-ever GLVC Tournament championship and the ninth conference regular-season championship. USI's 17-game winning streak was the longest in the history of the program, while the 18-2 league record tied for first all-time in the history of the program and third all-time in the GLVC for victories in a year.

The 27 wins in 2004-05 has USI ranked seventh among NCAA Division I, II, and III men's basketball programs with 25.6 victories per season since 1992-93.

During 2003-04, Herdes directed the Screaming Eagles back to Division II's center stage as the NCAA II Elite Eight finalists and the Great Lakes Regional Champions. He was named the *Division II Bulletin* Coach of the Month for December when he led the Screaming Eagles to an 11-0 record last year and to the program's seventh NUMBER ONE ranking in 10 seasons. Herdes' Eagles also finished the season one win short of the school record with a 28-7 overall mark.

In his second season at the helm of the men's basketball program, Herdes took the Screaming Eagles back to the big dance and to within three-point range of the NCAA Division II Elite Eight.

Herdes directed the Eagles to a 25-7 overall record, a 16-4 mark in the GLVC, and the Great Lakes Regional finals after defeating No. 1-ranked Michigan Tech University in the semifinals. The squad, which also boasted an honorable mention All-American, two All-Region performers, and three All-GLVC players, advanced in the Sweet 16 of the national tournament for the seventh time in nine seasons.

In his first season at the helm, Herdes had a record-tying year. The Eagles posted a 22-8 overall record, tying the USI record for wins by a first-year coach. He also led the Eagles to a fourth-place finish in the Great Lakes Valley Conference with a 14-6 mark, advancing to the semifinals of the league's post-season tournament.

Herdes had been with USI for nine seasons as an associate head coach and assistant coach before being tapped for the top position in 2001. He is widely known as one of the best recruiters and top coaches in Division II basketball. The Eagles' successes since Herdes' arrival reflect his abilities.

In his nine seasons at USI, Herdes has helped direct the Eagles to a 231-46 overall record (.833), the 1995 NCAA II National Championship, the 1994 NCAA II National Championship game, three Great Lakes Valley Conference Championships, nine consecutive NCAA II Tournament appearances, and nine straight 20-win seasons. USI has averaged over 25 victories a season since 1993-94.

USI's point man on the recruiting trail, Herdes brought in nearly all of the key players who contributed to USI becoming a national power in Division II. Some of those key recruits were two-time NABC/NCAA Division II Player of the Year Stan Gouard, All-American and GLVC Player of the Year Chad Gilbert, Division II Bulletin All-American Jeremy Pearson, and 2001 first team All-American Derrick Lyons.

Herdes came to USI from Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville, where he was an assistant from 1986 to 1992. While at SIUE, Herdes helped Head Coach Larry Graham lead the Cougars to a 127-56 (.694) record and three NCAA tournament appearances. He was responsible for coordinating recruiting and was the academic advisor to the basketball team and director of summer camps and fundraising events.

In 1991 and 1992 at SIUE, he was the head coach for the Illinois Prairie State Games, Southern Open Men's Division. His 1992 team received the silver medal.

Prior to working at SIUE, Herdes was an assistant basketball coach and physical education instructor at Lawrenceville (Illinois) High School, where he worked for current Indiana University assistant coach Ron Felling. LHS was the Illinois Class A State Champion in 1982 and 1983 and had a 68-game winning streak. Herdes was inducted into the Illinois High School Athletic Association Hall of Fame in 1998.

Herdes graduated from Graceland College in 1980 with a bachelor's degree in education. As a player, he led Lincoln Trail College to a ninth-place finish in the national tournament and helped lead Graceland to its first-ever appearance in the NAIA Tournament.

Herdes and his wife Sarah reside in Evansville with his two children, a daughter Taylor (13) and a son Connor (10).

Head Coach **Rick Herdes**, the Division II Bulletin Coach of the Month for December 2003, has been a part of 460 victories during his collegiate coaching career.

Herdes has had a hand in over half of the USI men's basketball program's 652 victories. He has helped the Eagles to 333 victories in 13 seasons with the USI men's basketball program.

In 2003-04, Herdes led the Screaming Eagles back to the NCAA II National Championship game for the first time in 10 years. He led the Eagles to their first-ever GLVC Tournament title in 2004-05 after winning the GLVC regular-season title with a conference mark of 18-2.

He has led the Eagles to two NCAA II Regional Championship games and three straight NCAA II Tournament appearances. He has averaged more than 25 wins per year in his first four seasons at the helm of USI men's basketball program.




Herdes was recently featured in *American Basketball Quarterly*.

In 2005-06, the Eagles will have all 16 home games broadcast on television. Coach Herdes also has a local radio show as well as a weekly television show.



Marc Hostetter returns for his fifth season as an assistant coach to Head Coach **Rick Herdes**.

Hostetter's third season was highlighted with USI's return to the NCAA II Elite Eight. The 2003-04 appearance in the championship marked the third time that Hostetter and Herdes have appeared in the title game and Hostetter's first as a coach.

Hostetter rejoined the USI program after spending two seasons as an assistant coach to Mike Leeder at Longwood College in Virginia. Hostetter helped lead the Lancers to a 23-8 overall record, Longwood's first-ever Carolinas-Virginia Athletic Conference championship, and an NCAA Division II Tournament appearance.

"Marc has the complete package, both as a person and a coach," said Coach Herdes. "I recruited Marc to USI, and his knowledge of the system and University as well as the league and Division II basketball is a great asset to our program.

"Marc has prepared himself to be a head coach and a good one," Herdes concluded.

The Lyons, Indiana, native returns to the USI team he helped lead to the 1995 NCAA Division II National Championship and a 105-17 record in his four seasons as a point guard. During Hostetter's four seasons, the Screaming Eagles were ranked number one nationally at some point during the season in three of four seasons.


After his playing days, Hostetter joined the staff of former USI Head Coach Bruce Pearl for two seasons as an assistant coach.

He also was an assistant coach under GLVC-legend Joe Reibel at Bellarmine University when the Knights earned a share of the conference title and appeared in the NCAA II Great Lakes Regional Tournament.

"Bobby is a tireless worker with a wealth of basketball knowledge,"

Herdes said. "He is a great recruiter who has nation-wide contacts at the junior college and high school levels."

Prior to his tenure at Bellarmine, Ward was the head coach at Southeast Community College (1980-82) and Union University (1987-89).

Ward graduated from Murray State with a bachelor's degree in physical education and health education and a master's degree in education. He has a daughter Clare and a son Samuel.




Brent Hancock, Student Strength & Conditioning Coach

Prior to attending IWU, Brothers was a two-sport letter winner at Memorial High School in Evansville.






Rick Herdes and Marc Hostetter have teamed up throughout the years to lead the Screaming Eagles to new heights.

During the last 26 years, the University of Southern Indiana men's basketball program has become a force in the Great Lakes Valley Conference, the Great Lakes Region, and at the national level.


Since the beginning of the GLVC in 1979, the Screaming Eagles have become one of the premier teams in the league, winning nine regular-season titles in the GLVC. USI's teams also have featured three GLVC Coaches of the Year and five conference Players of the Year.

Starting with the 1992-93 USI team, the Eagles have made their mark on the Great Lakes Region and the NCAA Division II. USI has won 20 or more games 14 times in the last 16 years, including the last 13 seasons, and averaged more than 25 victories a year since 1993-94.


The Eagles stepped into the national spotlight in 1993-94 when they made their first trip to the NCAA Division II Elite Eight and the NCAA Division II Championship game.

The loss in the 1994 championship game propelled USI back into the NCAA Division II Championship game in 1995, and on to its first-ever national championship.


USI has been ranked number one nationally at one point during the season in eight of the last 11 years and has been to the NCAA Division II Sweet 16 eight times in the last 11 years.
