BUS SERVICE TO ISUE

The Evansville and Ohio Valley Transportation Co., Inc. is providing bus service Monday through Friday from the Evansville Greyhound Bus Terminal to Mt. Vernon beginning on January 3, 1972. The bus service will make a stop at the Evansville Campus each day.

The schedule for the bus service is as follows:

The bus fare from Evansville to ISUE is 55¢ one way, \$1.05 roundtrip; from Evansville to Mt. Vernon is 85¢ one way, \$1.65 roundtrip; and from the Evansville Campus to Mt. Vernon is 65¢ one way, \$1.25 roundtrip. The bus service will not operate on Saturday, Sunday, or holidays.
