Health Insurance Information: The period of open enrollment for health care coverage will be September 7-20. Currently, the University offers coverage through Blue Cross/Blue Shield and Maxicare Health Maintenance Organization (HMO). Effective October 1, the University will continue to offer health care coverage through Blue Cross/Blue Shield and will begin offering coverage through Welborn HMO. The contract with Maxicare **will not** be renewed for the 1988-89 contract year.

Representatives from Blue Cross/Blue Shield and Welborn HMO will be on campus on Thursday, September 8. Staff meetings have been scheduled for 11 a.m., 12 noon, and 2 p.m. in L100. If you are not participating in one of the University-sponsored health care plans, if you need to add eligible dependents, or if you are interested in changing your current health care coverage, please plan to attend one of the informational meetings. If you are unable to attend, stop by the Personnel Office for enrollment and rate information.

The period of open enrollment is very important. It will be the **only** opportunity during the 1988-89 contract year to enroll in one of the University-sponsored health care plans or to transfer your membership to a different plan. Enrollment papers must be completed and returned to the Personnel Office by September 20 to ensure health insurance coverage effective October 1. If you have questions, please contact the Personnel Office, extension 1770.

Please note that due to the Labor Day holiday, payroll deductions for health insurance premiums for biweekly employees will not be taken on the September 9 pay checks. The total premium will be deducted from the pay check on September 23.

VEHICLE REGISTRATION. A registration decal required for all vehicles operated and parked on campus must be in place by Monday, September 19, to avoid parking tickets and fines. The decal -- blue USI on a red and white field -- does not expire and is not transferrable. It should be permanently affixed to the lower right corner of the rear window (inside).
