Eddie Miles will perform his "Salute to Elvis" at 7:30 p.m. Friday, June 10. Miles is considered to be one of the world's best Elvis tribute artists. Charlie Hodge, Elvis' backup singer, called Miles "the closest you will find to the looks and sound of Elvis," and DJ Fontana, Elvis' drummer, said, "Eddie looks great, sings great, and does a fantastic tribute to Elvis."

Gospel lovers will enjoy the sounds of the legendary southern gospel quartet, **The Florida Boys**, at 2 p.m. Sunday, June 26. The Florida Boys have been entertaining and inspiring listeners for more than 50 years with number one hits such as "Standing on the Solid Rock," "When He Was on the Cross, I Was on His Mind," "Lead Me to the Altar," and "I Lean on you Lord."

Hank Williams Sr., George Jones, Willie Nelson, Loretta Lynn, Marty Robbins, and Roy Orbison, live! Or at least their look-alikes will perform a "Tribute to Country Legends" at 7:30 p.m. Friday, July 8.

At 7:30 p.m. Friday, July 15, there will be a double bill featuring the piano-pumping rockabilly of **Blair Carman** and the western swing and "hillbilly boogie" of Stick Andrews and the **Crooked River Playboys**. Carman has been called "the hottest thing to happen to piano since Jerry Lee Lewis." Blair and his Belleview Boys have the look and sound of 1950s rock and roll.

Country royalty will pay a visit to Lincoln Amphitheatre when Jeannie Seely, Jan Howard, and Helen Cornelius take the stage at 7:30 p.m. Friday, July 22, as "Ladies of the Grand Ole Opry." Seely is often called "Miss Country Soul," a reference to her deeply moving vocals. Her many hits include "Don't Touch Me" and "Wish I Didn't Have to Miss You" with Jack Greene. Howard's string of gutsy hits includes "Evil on Your Mind" and "Rock Me Back to Little Rock." Cornelius is known for her solo recordings, including "You Don't Bring Me Flowers," and for the many hits she recorded with Jim Ed Brown, including "I Don't Want to Have to Marry You."

One of the music world's great innovators, Grammy Awardwinning mandolinist **Sam Bush**, will perform at 7:30 p.m. Friday, July 29. Bush has been called "one of the best pickers ever to play." In addition to mandolin, he plays fiddle, banjo, and guitar. A member of the defunct New Grass Revival (a band which also included Evansville native John Cowan and banjo hero Bela Fleck), Bush's sterling picking was featured on the "O Brother, Where Art Thou" soundtrack.

The Temple Airs will perform a benefit performance for Lincoln Amphitheatre at 7:30 p.m. Friday, August 5. Evansville's big band has been playing together for over 20 years.

All the concerts will be presented at Lincoln Amphitheatre, Lincoln State Park, in Lincoln City, Indiana. Tickets are \$20 for each of the concerts in the series, but children under 18 will be admitted for \$8 to the "Celebrate America!" concert. For tickets or more information call 800/264-4ABE.

The Southwestern Indiana Regional Development Commission (SWIRDC) is offering an opportunity to explore the historic Wabash River during the Wabash Heritage Paddle Fest on Saturday, August 6. Participants will paddle their canoes 9.7 miles from Grayville, Illinois, to Historic New Harmony, Indiana. There will be canoe floats beginning at 11 a.m., noon, and 1 p.m., in Grayville.

SWIRDC Executive Director Nancy L. Burns said that the event will be a good opportunity to learn more about the history of both communities. "There will be information about the history of the Wabash at both locations," she said. "It's a fun event."

Canoe rental will be available for \$20 or participants may bring their own canoes. Amy Brown of Canoe Evansville will teach a beginner's canoe class for \$10, and there also will be free lectures on canoe camping, canoeing with kids, coldwater canoeing, and yoga for boaters.

There will be safety measures in place, including dive teams along the route. Life jackets will be available.

Registration begins in both New Harmony and Grayville at 8 a.m. and is \$20 for adults and \$12 for children under 12. Two buses will provide transportation between New Harmony and Grayville every half hour. Call Burns at 812/465-7067 for detailed information and registration.

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## **Reflection Lake Gazebo donated**

The gazebo that seemed to pop up overnight on the edge of Reflection Lake is one of the latest donations to the University by the West Side Nut Club. There will be a landscaping stone on site engraved with the name of the club, its officers (Cissell, vice president Joe Beck, treasurer Dan Fulton, and secretary Mark Weinzaphel) and project manager Stanton Elfreich.

Beck said the gazebo could be used for a variety of functions, including student events, weddings, "or whatever the University deems fit."

Manufactured by an Amish company, the gazebo is made of vinyl and should be maintenance-free, Cissell said. The club also will install a pump in Reflection Lake that will irrigate the landscaping.
