NON CREDIT COURSES IN FULL SWING. The six non credit courses offered by the ISUE Office of Continuing Education, now in their second week of classes, are completely filled. Only one class, Genealogy, has openings for two more participants while the others have a waiting list. A total of 195 people are presently enrolled in the non credit courses.

According to *M. Edward Jones*, Director of Continuing Education, the classes have attracted people from as far away as Tell City, with several from Posey County, Gibson County, and Henderson, Kentucky. He also remarked that he is very pleased with the amount of interest the community has shown in these courses.

TUBERCULIN SKIN TESTS AVAILABLE. The ISUE Health Service, located in AD 115, offers T.B. skin tests to all students and/or employees for a fee of \$.50. These screening tests are administered and interpreted by *Pat Like*, University Nurse. 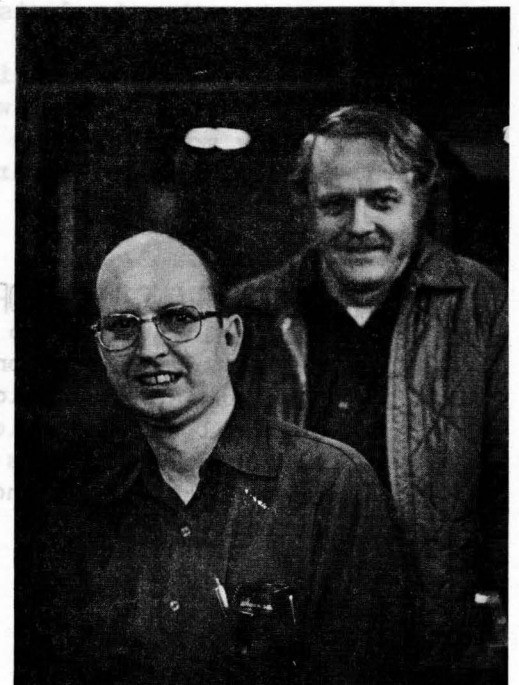

ACQUISITIONS SECRETARY ACQUIRES NEW POST. *Cleoramae Graper*, Acquisitions Secretary in the Library, has achieved a dream--her own personal goal--that of becoming a permanent, full-time minister. For the past several months, Rev. Graper has performed as minister at the St. Stephens United Church of Christ in Warrenton on a "permanent temporary" basis. The Church has now asked her to become their full-time minister, which is quite a coup since no woman in the conference heads a church body and normally no staff has over one woman as a member.

Rev. Graper was ordained in 1969 after graduating from Defiance College and The Chicago Theological Seminary (cum laude). She has also studied at Wroxton College in England. Formerly Director of Christian Education at St. John's United Church of Christ in Evansville from 1965-7, Rev. Graper especially enjoys Bible study classes, which she hopes to encourage in her new post. That's only one of many plans for St. Stephen's Church, according to Rev. Graper. An enthusiastic advocate of all phases of Bible study, she has presented topics during the Lenten season on "Hymns of Holy Week" and "Symbols of Holy Week." Talking with Rev. Graper on these studies and her plans, it becomes apparent that she abounds with eager enthusiasm.

"St. Stephens Church," Rev. Graper said, "is a small country Church with a very nice middle class congregation with professions ranging from farmers to professional persons. Most are local residents; however, some drive from Evansville for services (approximately 18 miles one way) and one family comes each week from Princeton."

In her new position, Rev. Graper will be officiating at weddings, baptisms, administering communion and other rituals, all duties she has performed before but never with the complete Church responsibility on her shoulders. She looks forward eagerly to the job and is now in the process of moving into the parsonage which is located next to the Church. The fact that this is a small country parish is not a bit disappointing to the Reverend Ms. Graper. One of her most memorable summers during seminary study was spent with a Church in Maybell, Colorado, which, according to *Cleoramae*, was located amidst the cactus and wilderness of Colorado and was 35 miles into nowhere. St. Stephens, on the other hand, is happily close to her hometown of Haubstadt.

Regular Sunday worship at St. Stephens United Church of Christ is held each Sunday at 9:00 a.m. with Sunday School beginning at 10:10 a.m. If on some Sunday mornings some of her ISUE friends and acquaintances can be counted among the regular parishioners, the Reverend *Cleoramae Graper* would be most thrilled.
