JESUIT THEOLOGY PROFESSOR TO BE NEWMAN LECTURER

The Rev. John A. Coleman, S.J., professor of religion and society at the Jesuit School of Theology at Berkeley, California, will present the sixth annual John Henry Newman Lecture at 8 p.m. Monday, October 18, in the UC Dining Room.

Dr. Coleman's interests include the sociology of religion, social ethics, and American culture and religion. He will speak on "Religion and the Idea of the University." Dr. Coleman has been a senior consultant for the "History of the Roman Catholic Ministry," a Lilly Foundation project, and was principal investigator for "Family Transmissions: Continuity and Change Across Generations," a research project at the Institute of Human Development, University of California at Berkeley. INDIANA HEALTH INDUSTRY FORUM

A newly formed steering committee for the Indiana Health Industry Forum is holding October roundtable discussions in four Hoosier locations to collect ideas on what Indiana needs to become a global center for the health industry.

The first discussion -- open to the public -- is scheduled from 1 to 4 p.m. Friday, October 15, in Forum I at USI. Other discussions will be October 21 in Gary and South Bend and October 29 in Indianapolis.

The discussions are an outgrowth of a June 14 forum in Indianapolis, where more than 60 Hoosiers gathered with Governor Evan Bayh -- other elected officials, business leaders, university presidents, and hospital officials. The consensus of that meeting was that Indiana should develop a public/private initiative to target the health care industry for economic development, and ideas are being sought statewide to determine the best approach.

account for, and safeguard cash at USI is the Business Office. Specifically, this office is responsible for collecting fees and other income, making all fee refunds, preparing bank deposits, issuing petty cash disbursements, issuing change funds to authorized units, and assessing student fees.

Under no circumstance is an employee to accept money in the name of the University without properly recording the income with an official University receipt. A receipt will be issued by the Cashier's Office for all cash received except for that received by approved satellite operations. Departments that have been approved to accept money are required to issue receipts and make daily deposits, and are responsible for maintaining their own receipt subsidiary records on forms approved by the comptroller.

Any loss of funds should be reported immediately to the Cashier's Office and the University Security Office.
