ACTIVIST AGAINST SEXUAL ABUSE TO SPEAK. Ms. Katherine Brady, an internationally recognized expert and activist on the issues of rape, date rape, sexual child abuse, incest, and sexual harassment, will speak at 7:30 p.m. Monday, January 23, in the University Center. The program, sponsored by the Activities Programming Board, is free and open to the public. Ms. Brady's pioneering autobiography of her own childhood dominated by incest and rape, Father's Days, broke the cultural taboo on public examination and discussion of this social problem. The book became a best seller and has been adopted as a text at colleges and universities throughout the U.S., as well as a resource for legislators, psychiatrists, psychologists, social workers, human resource professionals, and countless victims and perpetrators. Ms. Brady's two appearances on the "Donahue" television talk show remain among the highest response-generating programs in the show's history. She now is working on a sequel to Father's Days which will be the story of how she made the transition from incest victim to survivor, activist, and educator.

Ms. Brady is a sought after speaker and has spoken to nearly half a million college students in the last eight years. She has been lauded for her ability to effectively bridge the gap between the academic world and the lay audience. Her sensitive and honest approach to her topic has been especially effective in drawing out victims and perpetrators in her audiences, many of whom have never told anyone about their problem. Talking with these persons privately, she often is able to help them by encouraging them to seek professional help. A career woman and mother of two teenage daughters, Ms. Brady continues her consciousness-raising work with the same energy with which she began. Echoing the thoughts with which she closed her best-selling book, she says, "I keep this work going in order to give the once and future victims the two messages I needed most but had to wait years to hear: 'You are not alone and you are not to blame.' I'm not going to stop talking about the problem until the problem stops."

AIDS FORUM. A public forum on AIDS will be held at 7 p.m. Friday, January 27, in Forum I, using a National Issues format to discuss various viewpoints about AIDS. Dr. Charles F. Petranek, chairman of the Sociology Department, will show a videotape, then moderate the public discussion. Leadership Evansville also is sponsoring National Issues forums to help the public better understand the issues facing America today. Students, faculty, staff, and the public are invited to participate in the USI forum.

Communications Major/Minor: Interpersonal and Organizational Communication
Emphasis -- Change: formerly General Communications major; changed from 42 hours to 30 hours; minor remains 24 hours. Changes reflect lowered hours for majors in journalism, radio-television, and public relations. Stronger attention to courses in this more restricted area.

ENG 302 Creative Writing -- Change: New prerequisite of a grade of B or better in ENG 101 or ENG 102, or consent of the instructor.

ENG 425 Literature of the Middle Ages -- Change: Deletion; the material in this course generally is taught in the Humanities surveys.

HP 312 Current Concepts in the Health Professions -- Change: Title changed from Current Concepts Seminar for the Health Professions.

HPER 384 Advanced Athletic Training -- Change: Change title/number HPER 383 Practicum in Athletic Training, because a course entitled Advanced Athletic Training is a prerequisite to sit for the certification examination.

PSY 341 Psychopathology of Childhood -- Change: Deletion; not needed in undergraduate curriculum in Psychology; material will be covered in other courses.

PSY 402 Health Psychology -- Change: Deletion; not needed in undergraduate curriculum.

PSY 491 Advanced Developmental Psychology -- Change: Deletion; not needed in undergraduate curriculum.
