"Girl Culture" photographer at USI

Los Angeles-based photographer **Lauren Greenfield** will present a slideshow lecture on her "Girl Culture" exhibition at 1:30 p.m. Sunday, October 1, in Carter Hall in the University Center at USI. "Girl Culture" runs at the Evansville Museum of Art, History, and Science through December 3.

The exhibition is the result of a two-year effort by the museum, the Girl Scouts of Raintree Council, The Women's Hospital, and more than 20 local organizations including social service agencies, libraries, and schools to raise community awareness about the harmful effects of media messages and cultural expectations on girls.

The project was initiated in response to findings indicating girls experience strong pressure to conform to images and messages in popular culture that are not always in their best interests.

In her artist statement, Greenfield writes, "Girl Culture has been my journey as a photographer, as an observer of culture, as part of the media, as a media critic, as a woman, as a girl.

"I am interested in the tyranny of the popular and thin girls over the ones who don't fit that mold. I am interested in the competition suffered by the popular girls, and their sense that being popular is not as satisfying as it appears. I am interested in the costly and time-consuming beauty rituals that are an integral part of daily life. I am interested in the fact that to fall outside the ideal body type is to be a modern-day pariah. I am interested in how girls' feelings of frustration, anger, and sadness are expressed in physical and self-destructive ways: controlling their food intake, cutting their bodies, being sexually promiscuous. Most of all, I am interested in the element of performance and exhibitionism that seems to define the contemporary experience of being a girl."

Greenfield's lecture is presented in cooperation with USI and the Canon Corporation and is free and open to the public.

He has been a fraternity/sorority advising professional for over 15 years and has worked in that capacity at Longwood University and Northwestern University. He also served as director of leadership education for the North-American Interfraternity Conference and coordinated such programs as the Undergraduate Interfraternity Institute (UIFI), Futures Quest, and IMPACT.

He has served on the executive board of the Association of Fraternity Advisors (AFA) and as associate executive director of the Mid-American Greek Council Association (MGCA). He is the recipient of the AFA Distinguished Service Award, and the South East Panhellenic Conference (SEPC) Outstanding College Panhellenic Advisor Award. Beta Theta Pi and Phi Kappa Tau fraternities both named him Greek Advisor of the Year. The MGCA named their Outstanding Professional Award in his honor.

Dealph received his Bachelor of Science degree in business from USI and a master's degree in college student personnel from Bowling Green State University. While at USI, he served as president of Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity, Interfraternity Council president, Spring Week and Eagle Gran Prix chair for APB, as an RA, and an AMIGO.

In addition to Dealph's address, there will be three breakout sessions focusing on a variety of leadership topics. Lunch will be provided.

Nominate a student for Who's Who

Feminist for Life at USI on October 17

The University's Newman Catholic Student Ministry is hosting a presentation by **Sally A. Winn**, senior communications specialist for Feminists for Life of America, at 8 p.m. Tuesday, October 17, in Carter Hall in the University Center. Winn will present "Refuse to Choose: Reclaiming Feminism."

According to a release from Feminists for Life, the organization was founded in 1972 and "continues the efforts of the early American feminists, including Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton, to systematically eliminate the root causes that drive women to abortion by facilitating practical solutions. FFL has emerged as the link between the pro-life and pro-choice organizations, working on legislative efforts such as child support enforcement and the Violence Against Women Act, and opposing the child exclusion provisions in welfare reform."

Recent efforts by the organization on college campuses have inspired the introduction of the Elizabeth Cady Stanton Pregnant and Parenting Student Services Act. The bill, which has already passed the House of Representatives, would provide grants to eligible institutions of higher education to establish student services offices for students who are pregnant or parenting, students anticipating a birth or adoption, and students who place a child for adoption.

Winn has served on many state and local Right to Life boards and went on to become the executive director of Democrats for Life of America and Women and Children First, the largest provider of pro-life information on the Internet. She later chaired the National Pro-Life Democrats Committee and was a board member of the Feminism and Nonviolence Studies Association.

cMoe opportunities for learning

USI teacher education students have helped develop workshops to enrich learning at the new Koch Family Children's Museum of Evansville (cMoe). The workshops supporting the exhibits will be used with field trip groups.

Vella Goebel, assistant professor of education, said, "A number of the students were so enthralled with the opportunities at the museum that they volunteered to help with the grand opening and other activities."

Teacher education faculty and pre-service teachers are continuing their long-time relationship with the museum, which was known as Hands On Discovery when it was located in Washington Square Mall. The new cMoe opens September 29 in the former Central Library building in downtown Evansville. The historic building was renovated to house the museum.

Roto Studio, an internationally-recognized museum design and engineering firm based in Columbus, Ohio, created cMoe's interactive exhibits: Work Smart, Live Big, Speak Loud, Quack Factory, and Freedom Gallery.

Dr. Michael Slavkin, associate professor of education and director of graduate studies in education, has served on the museum board for four years. He is board vice president for education and exhibits.

Three years ago the board began redeveloping the museum, looking at its mission and the role it could play as an educational resource in the community.

Slavkin said focus groups that included children played a big part in the development of cMoe. In particular, children's ideas for a climbing structure and a health area are reflected in the facility's new exhibits.

"The museum really does meet the demands and needs of the community," Slavkin said. "We did everything possible to ensure that any hint, characteristic, or idea that community partners brought to us was included."

Goebel's students in a summer session class on educational assessment visited the museum as it neared completion to see the exhibits and get inspiration for their service-learning assignment. **Patti Wright**, director of education and experience for the museum, said the USI students developed pre-visit and post-visit activities for teachers to use as supplementary materials in addition to the workshop lesson plans. The workshops support Indiana academic standards for the various age groups. Best of all, they are interesting and fun.

USI teacher education students also helped the museum continue its mission while it was closed for two years in preparation for the relocation. Slavkin's students prepared Exhibits-to-Go boxes which teachers could check out and use in their classrooms. The boxes were filled with suggested activities and lesson plans on topics such as community helpers, natural resources, and inventions.

December Warren, director of cMoe, said the boxes were highly utilized but have gone into hiding as the staff concentrates on the opening. Exhibits-to-Go may be used again at a later time.

Slavkin said USI students benefit from the partnership with the museum because they get to develop curriculum that has meaning and relevance in the community.

"We've had students during their student teaching assignment who have told us that teachers down the hall were using their Exhibits-to-Go box," Slavkin said.

Warren said, "The participation of the USI faculty and students has certainly contributed to the depth and breadth of experience at the children's museum. It's been a win-win situation."

The Department of Teacher Education and the Children's Museum of Evansville will have a continuing relationship through field experiences and placements.

"Eleemosynary"

USI Theatre presents Eleemosynary, a play by Lee Blessing, Wednesday, October 4, through Sunday, October 15. It features three generations of women struggling to balance their love for each other with their individual expectations and needs. Dorothea is the eccentric and stubborn family matriarch, while her daughter, Artie, is more down-to-earth but unable to cope with the day-to-day responsibilities of raising her daughter, Echo. Echo lives with Dorothea and devotes herself to her studies, but longs for a closer relationship with her moth-

er. According to The St. Paul Pioneer Press, Eleemosynary is a "funny, perceptive and eloquently written" play.

The production marks **Lenny Leibowitz's** directorial debut in the Evansville area. Leibowitz taught at Boston University and directed Off-Broadway and at major regional theatres across the country before moving to Evansville this summer to accept the positions of assistant professor of theatre at USI and artistic director of The New Harmony Theatre, the professional summer theatre produced by USI.

According to Leibowitz, the play "ultimately hinges on a question that resonates with all of us: how do we understand those we love on their terms rather than on our own?"

The cast of Eleemosynary includes USI students **Joanne Gottcent** as Dorothea, **Kensington Blaylock** as Artie, and **Jasmine Ruckriegel** as Echo. The design team for Eleemosynary includes USI theatre students **Greg Schafer** as scenic designer, **Robert Dagit** as lighting designer, and **Ryan Nash** as sound designer. USI faculty member **Shan Jensen** is the costume designer.

Eleemosynary runs October 4-7 and October 11-15 in the Mallette Studio Theatre on the lower level of the Liberal Arts Center. Performance times are Wednesdays and Thursdays at 7 p.m., and Fridays and Saturdays at 8 p.m. There is one Sunday matinee at 2 p.m. on October 15.

Single ticket prices are \$10 for adults, \$8 for non-USI students and for seniors 60 and over, and \$4 for USI students. Season tickets for all productions in the USI Theatre season also are available at a discount. Tickets also may be purchased at the door; the box office will open one hour before each performance.

Higher Learning Commission

At its exit interview on Wednesday, September 27, 2006 concluding two-plus days in meeting with USI students, faculty, and staff, the site visit team from the Higher Learning Commission (HLC) of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools reported that full 10-year accreditation will be recommended to the HLC. The team also will recommend approval of USI's distance learning application.

Dr. Linda L.M. Bennett, provost and vice president for Academic Affairs, expressed her pleasure with the site visit and the recommendation and extended appreciation to all faculty, staff, and students who took time to participate. She said, "The extraordinary participation in this process from those working on subcommittees to those engaged in planning for this visit and meeting with our site visit team had a very positive impact. None of this would be possible without the entire University pulling together to highlight what an outstanding institution USI is."

Team chair **Dr. Roberta Teahan**, in delivering the team's assessment and recommendations, said the 10-year recommendation is made because USI met the HLC criteria and, in many cases, exceeded the expectations. She said a full report with the team's comments and recommendations will be sent to USI in six to eight weeks. The next HLC visit would be in the 2016-2017 academic year.

Dr. Teahan told the open meeting of faculty, staff, and students that she would like to work in a place "where students say what they say about your faculty." She also cited "the forward-thinking attitude that is found in the fiber of this place" and reported that students frequently commented on the value that USI has added to their lives.

President H. Ray Hoops thanked the site visit team members for their contributions to "an important process as we continually seek to improve the University."
