USI GRADUATE WINS ROTARY SCHOLARSHIP. **Ms. Laura Fredrich**, a USI graduate who now is an adjunct instructor in the Division of Humanities, has been named the recipient of the Rotary International Foundation scholarship. It will cover expenses of travel, tuition, lodging, and incidental needs for one academic year at the university of her choice, provided it is outside the United States. Ms. Fredrich was selected from among 50 applicants from colleges and universities in Indiana counties south of Indianapolis. She plans to use the scholarship to pursue graduate studies in Latin American History and is preparing applications to universities in Caracas, Venezuela; Porto Alegre, Brazil, and Buenos Aires, Argentina. The National University of the South in Buenos Aires is her preference.

Ms. Fredrich is the daughter of **Mr. Jay Fredrich**, chairman of the Division of Engineering Technology at USI, and his wife, **Cecelia**. A 1981 graduate of Memorial High School, she attended USI as a recipient of the Bronstein Scholarship for the study of art. She received her Bachelor of Arts degree in art in 1984, then spent three months studying Spanish at Universidad Ibero Americano in Mexico City. She later received a graduate fellowship for the study of Spanish at Indiana State University and was awarded the Master of Arts degree in Spanish with honors from ISU in 1986.

The announcement of Ms. Fredrich's selection was made January 20 at an Evansville Rotary Club awards luncheon. **USI President David Rice**, a Rotary member, reported the luncheon became a tribute to the excellence of USI students. **Mr. John Claybon**, a USI senior English and economics major, was first alternate among the 50 entries in the competition.

NAMES IN THE NEWS. The Canadian Embassy has notified **Dr. Charles T. Barber**, professor of political science, that he will receive a Canadian Studies Faculty Enrichment Program grant. The \$1,500 award supports travel in Canada as preparation for offering a course on the politics of Canada in 1988.

Mr. Tim Buecher, director of Admissions, has been asked to serve on the selection committee for the Alcoa Foundation Sons and Daughters Scholarship Program for the third consecutive year, and to chair the committee for the past two years. The committee membership also includes representatives from the University of Evansville and Kentucky Wesleyan.

Dr. Walter Jermakowicz, associate professor of business, will present a paper and make a presentation on the topic, "The Influence of Organizational Structures of Effectiveness: A Theoretical and Empirical Approach," at the 23rd Midwest Business Administrators Association meeting March 26-27 in Chicago.

Dr. Marwan Wafa, assistant professor of business, has had his paper, "An Investigation into the Factors Influencing the Success of Decision Support System (DSS) in the Construction Industry," selected for presentation at the Western Decision Sciences meeting March 8-13 in Palm Springs, California.

HUMANITIES FORUM. **Mr. John McNaughton**, professor of art, will discuss the large-scale sculpture created by himself and several USI students this past summer at Artpark in New York in a Humanities Forum on Tuesday, February 3. The sculpture is expected to remain at the park for at least two years. Mr. McNaughton's slide presentation will be made at 12:30 p.m. in Forum II. All interested persons are invited to attend.

ONE-PERSON SHOW AT NEW HARMONY. The New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art will present **Ms. Anne Horwedel** in a one-person show February 1-25, opening with a reception from 1 to 4 p.m. Sunday, February 1. Ms. Horwedel, a California native, now living in Otterbein, Indiana, received a B.A. from UCLA and an M.A. from Purdue University, and has shown her work extensively in the Midwest and throughout the United States. She celebrates womanhood in her canvases, but does not consider herself a feminist. A series of works from 1980-82 highlights lusciously painted cakes, each from a distinct phase of life, such as birthdays and weddings. In her most recent series, Ms. Horwedel uses symbols from history, mythology, and religion to express a spiritual beauty. Chalices, crowns, and wreaths surround women from Elizabethan and contemporary society to bring each work to life. Sequins, netting, and clay applied to the paintings create depth and add to the overall pattern. Luxurious fabrics such as moire satin and antique paisley are recreated in rich detail, to provide the background for Ms. Horwedel's historical scenes. She will show around 20 paintings at New Harmony. For those wishing to learn more about the stories behind and symbolism in her work, she will conduct an informal discussion on the iconography in her paintings at 2 p.m. Sunday (during the reception). The New Harmony Gallery's exhibition program is made possible in part by the Indiana Arts commission and the National Endowment for the Arts.

FINANCIAL AID WORKSHOP FEBRUARY 1. The sixth annual Tri-State Financial Aid Workshop sponsored by the USI Financial Aid and Admissions offices will be held at 2 p.m. Sunday, February 1, in Forum I. March 1 is the deadline to file for college financial aid for the 1987-88 academic year. The workshop will provide explanations of various types of federal, state, and institutional aid available, such as loans, grants, scholarships, and work-study programs, as well as how financial need is determined and how programs have changed in recent years. BREAKFAST TO COMMEMORATE FLOOD CREST. The University, the Vanderburgh County Historical Society, Grandy's restaurant, and the McCurdy Residential Center are sponsoring a breakfast at 8 a.m. Saturday, January 31, commemorating the worst day of the disastrous 1937 flood. The Ohio River was 25 miles wide when it crested on January 31, 1937, at 53.75 feet, the highest level ever recorded in this area. The operations center for flood relief was at the McCurdy, where the breakfast will be held. The sponsors hope to attract people who served as volunteers for the relief organizations, including the Army Corps of Engineers, the Coast Guard, American Red Cross, Girl and Boy Scouts, and the Works Progress Administration, as well as the general public.
