UNIVERSITY OF SOUTHERN INDIANA
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REWARD OFFERED. The USI Student Government Association has announced that a \$1,000 reward is being offered for information leading to the arrest and conviction of those persons involved with the rape of a USI student on campus September 7. The USI Security Department and Student Government Association both had pressed for the establishment of a reward in an effort to aid Indiana State Police in the investigation. Any persons with information about the crime should report that information to the Indiana State Police, 867-2079.

BOMB-THREAT ARREST. The Vanderburgh County Sheriff's Department announced Monday the arrest of 18-year-old freshman **LaDonna Miller**, who gave them a statement admitting to two of three recent bomb threats at the University. The investigation is continuing in two more threats called in after the arrest announcement Monday. The charge of making a false report is a Class D felony and carries a maximum penalty of four years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

RAPE AWARENESS SEMINARS SLATED. Seminars designed to instruct students on the personal and legal elements involved with sexual assault and self-protection methods will be presented at 3 and 5 p.m. Wednesday, October 5, in Forum I, continuing the University's effort to provide education and assistance in the wake of an assault in September. The seminars -- "Sexual Assault on Campus: What Students Can Do" -- will feature **Ms. Ada Meyer**, veteran officer with the Evansville Police Department's crime investigation unit; **Ms. Sandra Chase**, who has had 18 years of emergency room duty and now is director of emergency service at Deaconess Hospital; and **Ms. Ursula Hurt**, a psychiatric nurse at Deaconess, counseling assault victims and molested children.

Ms. Meyer will discuss police procedures, self-protection, and what the law provides through the Violent Crimes Victim Compensation Fund. Ms. Chase will discuss emergency room examination procedures and what to expect in the way of physical and emotional care. Ms. Hurt will discuss common reactions for victims, what family and friends can do to help them, and rape crisis counseling. The 30-minute program will be followed by a question-answer period. A videotape of the program will be played at 5 p.m. on October 10, 11, and 13 in Forum I. All interested persons are invited to attend any of the sessions, which are sponsored by USI Health Services, Student Activities, Counseling Center, and the Student Government Association.

LILLY ENDOWMENT LIBRARY GRANT. The Lilly Endowment has approved a \$2.9-million start-up grant for the Indiana Commission for High Education's Statewide Plan for University Library Automation, which will include the USI Library. The program will tie all public university library collections into a single, statewide computer network. Patrons at USI, Vincennes University, and Indiana State University will be

able to search and borrow from each other's collections as early as this academic year. The project previously received \$1.6 million from the state and preliminary equipment and planning are in place for the start-up phase. In the next nine to 18 months, Indiana's six public universities, encompassing 15 sites, will computerize their circulation procedures and a significant portion of their card catalogs and periodical collections, using a single computer system (NOTIS). The Indiana Vocational and Technical College will have access to the system within two years; private colleges and universities and local public libraries also can opt to tap into the system. The network will take five to six years to complete and will cost \$27 million.

NAMES IN THE NEWS. **Dr. Charles T. Barber**, professor of political science, represented USI on September 23 at the Indiana Consortium of International Programs fall board meeting at Purdue University.

Mr. Paul E. Bennett, associate professor of electrical engineering technology, has been elected vice chair for programs of the International Section, American Society for Engineering Education, for 1989-90.

Mrs. Linda Cleek, assistant director of the Continuing Education Department, is among the 49 members in the 1988-89 Leadership Evansville class. The group will spend at least one day a month for the next nine months concentrating on their community, its challenges, and its opportunities. In October, they will learn area history; in November, they will discuss leadership ethics; and from December through April, they will plan and present five educational seminars on important community issues.

Mr. Matthew Graham, assistant professor of English and creative writing, has had new work accepted for publication in the November issue of *Arts Indiana*.

Mrs. Sherrienne Standley, vice president for University Relations and 1988-89 president of the Indiana Council for the Support and Advancement of Education (ICASE), chaired the fall meeting September 21 at Franklin College. **Mrs. Suzanne A. Nicholson**, director of Development, led a seminar on new IRS regulations for charitable organizations, and **Mr. Ronald C. Roat**, assistant professor of journalism, participated in a seminar explaining software choices for desktop publishing.

Indiana Lieutenant Governor **John Mutz**, Republican candidate for governor, spoke to the Monday afternoon class taught by **Dr. Gregory P. Valentine**, assistant professor of business.

APPOINTMENT. **Mr. Larry Johnson** has been named coordinator of Media Services. INSTRUCTIONAL COMPUTING PROGRAM. Dr. G. Phillip Cartwright, an IBM consulting scholar, will discuss current and future technologies and factors affecting academic computing in a "Faculty Issues in Instructional Computing" program at 10 a.m. Wednesday, October 5, in UC308. He will portray a day in the life of a faculty member in 1993 and speculate about computing applications likely at that time. He is one of six IBM consultants spending a year visiting colleges and universities to assist faculty in computer use in the instructional process. Dr. Cartwright now is with the University of California, Davis, and previously was director of Pennsylvania State University's Office of Microcomputing Applications. He has spent more than 20 years developing and evaluating software for higher education and serves on numerous advisory panels and boards.
