Honorary degrees will be conferred on St. Angelo; Margaret Henderson (Meg) Blair, co-founder and president of Research Systems Corporation (rsc) of Evansville; Jennings D. "Nick" and Josephine K. "Jo" Carter of Evansville and Vero Beach, Florida, who have created a \$1-million scholarship trust at USI, and Byron C. Wright, USI senior vice president for Business Affairs.

The record number of graduates for the Commencement ceremony will include four students who will graduate summa cum laude with perfect 4.0 grade point averages -- Mr. Duane L. Kietel (Mt. Vernon, Indiana), chem-

istry major who has been accepted by the Indiana University School of Medicine; Ms. Amber F. Lucas (Vincennes, Indiana), elementary education major with a reading minor and middle school endorsement; Mrs. Patty Winiger McClellan (Mt. Vernon, Indiana), elementary education major who is considering returning for a middle school endorsement; and Ms. Nicole R. Wilson (Evansville), communications major who has been an environmental secretary with Sub-Tech, Inc., for four years and now expects to move into their public relations department.

USI's highest academic honors will be awarded this year to Dr. Daniel C. Scavone, professor of history, selected by his colleagues to receive the National City Bank Distinguished Professor Award, and Travis J Taylor, a Bristol-Myers Squibb Presidential Scholar and magna cum laude biology graduate who was selected by the Student Academic Affairs Committee to receive the President's Medal, the highest award given a graduating senior. Taylor is the son of Ronda Taylor of Gas City, Indiana, and graduated from Mississinewa High School.
