NAMES IN THE NEWS. Dr. Melvin W. Denner, chairman of the Division of Science and Mathematics and professor of biology, has been notified that a paper he has co-written with Dr. Richard Buckner has been accepted in the <a href="Proceedings">Proceedings</a> of the Indiana Academy of Sciences. The paper is entitled "Parasitic Endohelminths from Fishes of Southern Indiana."

Delbert E. Clayton, assistant professor of business, has had his paper on "POWER: Concepts and Habits" accepted for publication and presentation at the Mid-West Business Association Conference in Chicago March 28-30.

An article by Michael D. Waitman, assistant professor of English, will be published in the next issue of the <u>Journal of Mental Imagery</u>, the official journal of the International Imagery Association. The journal publishes articles "which demonstrate how the image acts as a truthful reporter of life," and will devote the next issue to essays about literature. Professor Waitman's article is entitled "Superman: Invulnerable to All But Kryptonite, Compassion, and Concupiscence."

TUTORS NEEDED. Regional Reading Aid, a non-profit organization which provides free, one-on-one, confidential literacy instruction to adults and teenagers, currently is enlisting volunteer tutors. Records show one of every five adult Americans is functionally illiterate, and about 2,100 adults in the Evansville area may not have the literacy skills to complete everyday tasks. Regional Reading Aid wants help in spreading the word that their free service is available, and also is signing up tutors. Tutor training workshops are scheduled February 5, 7 and 9.
