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"BURY THE DEAD" IS DRAMA STUDENTS' SPRING PRODUCTION. The ISUE Theatre will present Irwin Shaw's "Bury the Dead," April 5 - 7 and April 12 - 14, beginning at 8:00 p.m. each evening, at the ISUE Theatre.

Directed by Doug Hubbel, assistant professor of communications, the play is about six dead soldiers about to be buried as their mourners recite a burial chant. The six corpses rise in their graves and refuse to be put under. In spite of pressure brought to bear on them from superior officers, public opinion, and "their women" (wives, sweethearts, lovers and mothers), the six dead soldiers, who feel profoundly cheated, walk off into the world--a world they have not had enough of--at the end of the play. Because they died as a result of no specific war, Shaw's dramatic points become universal. As the rebellion of the corpses gains momentum, images are given of the earth spitting up all of its dead from all of its wars.

Director Hubbel says, "'Bury the Dead' is a strong statement against thoughtless slaughter, against militarism for its own sake." Written in New York when Shaw was 23 years old, the play has been called "a tremendously stirring piece of imaginative and argumentative drama," by critics.

General admission to the play is \$4.00, and \$3.00 for ISUE faculty, students and staff. Senior citizens will be admitted for \$3.00, with groups of 10 or more gathered in the lobby admitted at \$2.50 per person.

WSWI AIRS "THE MOST AMAZING 60 YEARS IN HISTORY" WSWI AM 82 will air an hour long presentation of the Time Education Program featuring "The Most Amazing 60 Years in History." This audio chronology presenting history of the years 1923 to 1983 will be aired Wednesday, March 21, from 3:00 to 4:00 p.m., and repeated Saturday, March 24 from 11:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m.

The key events of the period are reported in the actual words of Time Magazine and reflect the flavor, attitudes and state of knowledge of the day. Augmenting these excerpts are historical recordings of the leaders and personalities who shaped the age and reflected the spirit.

Historical events will be divided into six categories, starting with "War," which includes such recordings as the 1941 "Day of Infamy" speech by Franklin D. Roosevelt, the 1945 Potsdam speech by Harry S. Truman reporting the bombing of Hiroshima, and other major war-time events.

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In the second division of history, "The Turbulent World," listeners can hear Mahatma Ghandi describing his spiritual beliefs, John F. Kennedy announcing the presence of Soviet missiles in Cuba in 1962, and Richard Nixon's 1973 Watergate press conference.

A division titled "Triumphs of the Spirit" includes Charles Lindbergh's 1927 speech on returning from Paris and the "I have a dream" speech of Martin Luther King, Jr. Subjects covered in the "Economy" division are the 1929 stock market crash, Franklin D. Roosevelt's first Inaugural Address in 1933, and George C. Marshall's address at the 1947 Harvard Commencement.

The "Culture" division spotlights such historical figures as Charlie Chaplin, Ernest Hemmingway, Frank Lloyd Wright, the Beatles, and Pablo Picasso.

The "Science" division focuses on major events such as John F. Kennedy's 1961 appeal to Congress for funds to land a man on the moon, Neil Armstrong's first words on the lunar surface in 1969, and the discovery of DNA in 1971.

HUMANITIES FORUM FEATURES AQUATIC ART PERFORMANCES. Paul Krack, recreational sports coordinator, and Peg Dunn will present two aquatic performances in the ISUE Pool for the Humanities Forum March 26 from 1:00 to 2:00 p.m.

The first composition, entitled "Sardi's" and swum to "New York, New York," won awards for excellence at the 1983 Festival of the International Academy of Aquatic Art. "Ragtime Coquet," new this year, is choreographed to "A Waltz with Evelyn" from the movie "Ragtime."

"Playful Dolphins,"another performance, will be shown on videotape, along with several other pre-recorded aquatic shows.

In aquatic art, the idea is to communicate to the audience the mood or story behind the performance--not just swimming to music. Peg Dunn and Paul Krack have been members of the International Academy of Aquatic Art for three years, and have received several awards for their performances.

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"GROWING UP IN EVANSVILLE." The Office of Continuing Education now has "Growing Up in Evansville" on half-inchvideotape. It is 41 minutes long, and available for loan from the Evansville public libraries and the Continuing Education Office. Accompanying the film is a User's Guide.

Originally compiled by Dr. Darrel Bigham, professor of history, the videotape preserves the perspectives of native Evansvillians about the city's neighborhoods in the early 20th century.
