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

REQUIREMENTS FOR CONTINUING ENROLLMENT

The following grade-point averages, cumulative, are used for determining the academic status of students; i.e., whether the student will be admitted each semester as a regular student unconditionally or as a probation student:

Cumulative hours	Required grade-point average
0-16	1.00
17-32	1.25
33-45	1.50
46-60	1.80
61-	2.00

Each student is expected to achieve the grade-point average commensurate with the number of semester hours of credit attempted. Failure to do so will result in the student's being placed on probation, and failure to meet the required grade-point average while on probation will result in discontinuance from the University.

STANDARDS OF CONDUCT

Young men and women in college are of an age when the standards of conduct under which they have been reared have become their own and will serve as their moral guide line to behavior. Indiana State University expects self-discipline and self-direction of its students.

Several interested ISUE students will establish a Christian centered discussion group beginning Friday, April 5. The Christian College Discussion Group (CCDG) will be conducted by and for college students. The main purpose of the group is to enable students to discuss problems or topics which are of interest to them. One may voice his opinions with the group as a whole or in a smaller, separate group.

The CCDG is non-denominational and everyone is invited to attend the discussions. Meetings will take place every Friday at 7:00 P.M. in room number three at ISUE. An alternate meeting place will be the recreation lounge at St. Mark's Lutheran Church, 2300 Washington Avenue. The group will adjourn just before the opening of the Coffee House.

Faculty members sponsoring the CCDG will be Instructor Enrique Pujals and Assistant Professor Jim Roebuck. The Reverend Douglas Pearson, pastor of St. Mark's Lutheran Church, will be the religious supervisor. Skip Courter, freshman at ISUE, will act as Rev. Pearson's assistant.

Skip, the main originator of CCDG, is quite active in social, academic, and athletic work. He is a Speech major and Theology minor who maintains a C+ average. He hopes to someday be a chaplain in the Air Force. Besides carrying eighteen hours at school, he works twenty hours a week at the Ideal Pure Milk Company. Skip is also head trainer of the ISUE basketball team. Concerning the CCDG, Skip states, "Rev. Pearson will not be there as a Lutheran minister, but as a Christian trying to help young people." He further says that the group will be, "...a place where students can really find themselves. It is open to everyone."

General News About ISUE Progress

BIG EXPANSION OF ISUE FACULTY SCHEDULED FOR NEXT YEAR; BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEET; GOV. ROGER BRANIGIN AND INDIANA BUDGET AGENCY APPROVE ISUE FUNDS; REPLACEMENT OF FACULTY MEMBERS LEAVING AND NEW ADDITIONS WILL INCREASE STAFF TO 42 PROFESSORS

The faculty of Indiana State University Evansville Campus will be expanded by almost 45 per cent for the 1968-69 school year.

Approval to add 13 new instructors to ISUE's teaching staff was given by the university's board of trustees at its regular March 22 meeting, increasing the school faculty to 42 members.

ISUE Dean David Rice said that recruitment of instructors for the coming school year is underway at present and two new faculty members of the 13 have already accepted positions.

The trustees also gave their approval to final plans and specifications for the new \$4.3 million campus, to be built west of Evansville, thus clearing the way for bids to be accepted, hopefully by April 22.

President Alan Rankin had informed the trustees that approval by Gov. Roger Branigin and the state's Budget Agency for \$550,000 in site development funds for the new campus has been given prior to their action on the final plans.

The board's approval clears the way for immediate advertising of bids with contracts to be let by April 22, the same day that a federal grant of \$1,750,600 is expected to become available.

Original construction at the new campus will be a classroom building complex and a power plant, both to be located on the school's 270-acre tract in the vicinity of Schutte Road and Ind. 62.

The 13 new faculty members to be added at ISUE compare to 60 to be added at the main campus in Terre Haute.

President Rankin told the trustees that the coming year's increases would be basically in areas other than the Freshman teaching staff. They would mainly strengthen existing departments.

Other action taken by the trustees included:

.....Approval of a demonstration center at Terre Haute to prepare teachers in the field of driver and traffic safety instruction. It will be the first such school in the state and will be financed by federal and state funds.

.....Instructed Dr. Rankin to draw up guidelines to be followed in the future when controversial speakers are invited by independent student and faculty groups to speak at ISU. The action was taken after three speakers in recent weeks appeared at the Terre Haute Campus and prior to a pending visit by Gen. Edmund Walker on April 1.

.....Begin preliminary study on faculty and staff salaries for the 1968-69 school year. Specific recommendations are slated to be made at the April meeting.

Linda Brackett and Brenda Arnold, beginners in the Journalism Laboratory, will be in charge of the next issue. "We do not know, for sure, when the next issue will appear with its mistakes and miscalculations," Miss Arnold said.

Miss Brackett announced that the next issue of the Laboratory paper would try to express the thinking of the students and that she would endeavor to write the kind of news students prefer to read. She did not know exactly what this would be. Miss Brackett did not explain the kind of survey the group planned to complete.

The newspaper is to be circulated as soon as the students in the Journalism department feel it is ready to be read by their critics, according to Miss Arnold and Miss Brackett.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES APPROVES TWO ASSOCIATE PROFESSORS AS FACULTY MEMBERS

OF FAST-GROWING EVANSVILLE CAMPUS BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION FACULTY IN

ORDER TO ACCOMMODATE MORE THAN 250 BA MAJORS; EMPHASIS PLACED UPON THE

MASTERS DEGREE WORK (See Pictures On Page 4)

Mr. Edward J. Marting and Mrs. Barbara J. Marting have been approved by the Indiana State University Board of Trustees as Associate Professors on the faculty of the fast-growing Evansville Campus Business Administration faculty in order to accommodate the demand of more than 250 students who have declared major courses of study in a variety of disciplines, ranging from Marketing and Accounting to Business Education.

Mr. and Mrs. Marting, representing separate areas of specialization in Business Administration, have accepted positions on the ISU Evansville campus faculty, effective September, 1968, according to Dr. David Rice, Dean of ISUE.

The Martings are scheduled to participate in the ISUE leadership involved in a faculty self-evaluation program related to accrediting approval for a student to complete all of the requirements for a baccalaureate degree at ISU, Evansville, according to Dr. Paul Muse, Dean of ISU, Terre Haute, School of Business.

Area Head Jack Engelke said that the team of Edward and Barbara Marting is a welcomed addition to the ISUE faculty. "They represent growth, maturity, and strength in our business disciplines."

Mrs. Barbara Marting received the master's degree in Business Administration from Indiana State University, and will complete the doctorate degree from Arizona State University in August. She completed her undergraduate work at Evansville University. Her practical experience includes teaching at Chandler and New Castle, Indiana, the Universities of Arizona (State) and Evansville. She served as a teller at a savings and loan association in Chicago. Affiliations include Beta Alpha Kappa, Pi Gamma Mu, Delta Pi Epsilon, Sigma Iota Epsilon, and American Statistical Association.

In addition to twelve years of teaching experience at the secondary and the university levels, Mrs. Marting is qualified in the areas of Management, Marketing, and in Business Education and Business Communication, according to Dr. Paul Muse. She has worked for several years in secretarial assignments, and in executive secretary job responsibilities in the business community.

Mr. Edward Marting was awarded the bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Evansville and Indiana State University, respectively. He will complete the doctorate program at Arizona State University in August. He is a graduate of French Lick, Indiana, High School and affords a record of successful teaching in higher education at Arizona State University. His military record involves army services at intervals commencing in 1945 and continuing through 1957.

Bringing to the Evansville campus nine years of experience on the State Board of Accounts in the state of Indiana plus seven years of successful participation in Evansville, Indiana and Louisville, Kentucky businesses. Mr. Marting is qualified in Accounting, Management, and Finance, according to Dr. Paul Muse.

The undergraduate and graduate levels of ISUE business courses to be taught by the Martings represent a continuing effort in public higher education to establish ISUE as an institution fully accredited to offer the baccalaureate degree in Business Administration.

Dean Muse summarized the ISUE graduate program to be coordinated by the Martings in the Evansville Community and its environs as follows:

"1. Forty-two graduate hours in business and economics are available at the ISU Evansville Campus. From these available offerings, students are required to take twenty-four hours for credit toward the masters in Business Administration degree.

"2. Eighteen graduate hours in business and behavioral sciences are available at the ISU, Terre Haute, Campus through week-end seminars. From these available offerings, students take from nine to fifteen hours for credit toward the degree.

"3. Offerings at the ISU Evansville Campus are taught at hours to accommodate the student's work schedule. Regularly qualified staff from the ISU Evansville Campus and from the ISU, Terre Haute, Campus, teach the offerings. Required library references are made available at the ISUE Campus library.

"4. Offerings at ISU, Terre Haute, Campus are in the nature of week-end seminars. Each seminar meets for three hours Saturday morning and for three hours Saturday afternoon. The week-end sessions meet two weeks apart to permit out-of-class study and preparation. The ISU faculty supplements the seminars with highly specialized personnel from business and industry."

Students of the Laboratory Editorial Panel express favorable interest in the student and faculty leadership interested in an ISUE college newspaper being a part of the "planned progress for ISUE."

The publication is a classroom laboratory assignment for English and Journalism students at Indiana State University, Evansville Campus. The Editorial Panel is not limited to members of the English and Journalism classes. Any qualified student is eligible to participate in the training program represented in the Journalism and English classroom objective.

Dr. George Smock is Professor and Head of the English Department at Indiana State University. Professor Eric VonFuhrmann is Head of the Division of Communications, Arts, and Literature on the Evansville Campus.

Any interested faculty member or student is invited to participate in the Journalism activities. Miss Mary Richards, who is majoring in Psychology, is the Student Secretary to the ISUE Editorial Panel.

The first objective of the classroom Laboratory is to train students who plan to major in Journalism and who plan to transfer to another university, where they would be expected to meet all of the basic requirements in recognized Schools of Journalism.

There is another approved publication independent of the Journalism Laboratory publication on the ISUE Campus. The Literary Miscellany accommodates written material of a description varying in subject matter and for a long time self-defined in publishing practices on university campuses.

Understand The Term Liberal Arts:

TO OBTAIN A BACHELOR OF ARTS DEGREE, A STUDENT MUST COMPLETE 2 YEARS (Four Semesters) OF A SINGLE FOREIGN LANGUAGE. SERIOUS CONSIDERATION SHOULD BE GIVEN A FOREIGN LANGUAGE IF A STUDENT PLANS TO TAKE WORK ABOVE THE BACHELOR DEGREE

The term "liberal arts" refers to a broad background of educational experiences which should fit the student for worthy citizenship, for participation in cultural and aesthetic activities, and for graduate study in professional areas.

The liberal arts program can be summarized as follows: General Education, 50 hours; Foreign Language (for B.A. degree), 0-14 hours; Departmental major, 24-40 hours; Departmental minor, 12-23 hours; Electives (...); or a total of 124 hours.

The Bachelor of Science degree is granted to those students who follow the prescribed program except for the foreign language. TWO YEARS (four semesters) or the equivalent of a single foreign language are required for the BACHELOR OF ARTS. Liberal arts students should give serious consideration to the importance of foreign languages.
