# Archaeology Week explores Caborn Welborn site, features Paleoindian expert

Exhibits featuring recent archaeological discoveries in Posey County will open Friday, September 1, and continue through Saturday, October 7, at Alexandrian Public Library in Mt. Vernon, Carnegie Library in Poseyville, Hovey Lake Fish and Wildlife Area Interpreter's Center, and Workingmen's Institute in New Harmony. The exhibits will showcase excavations conducted since 1996 at the Hovey Lake village site, a late Mississippian Caborn-Welborn Indian site dating from A.D. 1400-1700. Archaeological investigations were conducted by Cheryl Ann Munson, research archaeologist at Indiana University, assisted by **Marjorie Jones**, USI instructor in anthropology, along with USI archaeology students.

Artifact Identification Day will be held from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. on Sunday, September 17, at Alexandrian Public Library in Mt. Vernon. Interested persons are encouraged to bring prehistoric and early historic artifacts to be identified by Cheryl Ann Munson and Patrick Munson, an anthropologist at IU.

Posey County fourth graders will visit Hovey Lake archaeological site Thursday and Friday, September 14 - 15, Monday through Friday, September 18 - 22, and Monday through Thursday, September 25 - 28. Students will have the opportunity to see archaeological research in progress and ask questions of USI students who are doing the work. Fourth graders also will participate in hands-on activities cataloging excavated artifacts and samples and interpreting maps and records from archaeological research.

Dr. Ken Tankersley, assistant professor of anthropology at Kent State University, will give an illustrated public lecture, "New Clues about Paleoindian Culture: the Earliest Americans, the First Hoosiers," at 7:30 p.m., Monday, September 18, at Alexandrian Public Library in Mt. Vernon.

Excavation tours will be held 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday - Sunday, September 30 - October 1, at the Hovey Lake site. Cheryl Munson and Marjorie Jones will join USI and University of Evansville students as they explain methods used in test excavations and interpret deposits and materials exposed. Jones will be at work in field laboratory with USI students and available to discuss the fate of artifacts after excavation. Jim Burton, naturalist at Angel Mounds, will demonstrate Native American pit-cooking and stone tool knapping. Visitors will be encouraged to participate.

Scout leaders and teachers of grades 4 - 8 may borrow archaeology learning kits and rent a 20-minute video about archaeology at the Hovey Lake site via the Internet at www.usi.edu/exser/archlgy/. The video is a newly-released joint project of IU and the Distance Learning Network at USI. Its production was supported by a grant from the Indiana Humanities Council.

Directions to Hovey Park Visitor's Center: Drive west of Mt. Vernon on SR 62, turn south on SR 69 to Hovey Lake. Park at the visitor's center. A van will shuttle visitors to the excavation area. Walking to the site is not advised. The excavation site is not handicap accessible.



# Student-designed outdoor sculpture greets freshmen of Governors Hall



Crane operators moved "Processing Component " from the bed of a truck to the lawn in front of Governors Hall on Saturday.

A student-designed geometric sculpture welcomes students to Governors Hall, the newest residence hall on campus. The 10' sculpture of cor-ten steel alloy and mild steel was designed during a summer workshop by USI students Mr. Damon Dawson, Mr. Peter Fehrenbacher, Mr. Jon Hittner, and Mr. Brandon Kight and installed on Saturday. The project was supervised by Mr. John McNaughton, professor of art.

"Protessing Component" is the name of the sculpture, which consists of a bundle of individual square tubes. The sculpture sits at a 45-degree angle on its point on a three foot steel cube. "It depicts a processor and its abstract nature is open to interpretation by the viewer," said Mr. Kight, who completed requirements for his art degree with this class project.

Mr. Dawson said the processor is about input and output and the changes that take place through the processor. He relates the processor to the freshmen who live in Governors Hall. "They are the input and their journey through college (through the processor) will produce the output."

The sculpture was fabricated at Sterling Boiler & Mechanical, Inc., in Evansville. "It weighs 2,325 lbs.," said Mr. Lan Bradley, the fabrication superintendent. Mr. Bradley's son Kyle, a USI graduate who studied art and now works at the fabrication company, coordinated the effort. The company donated both materials and time to fabricate and weld the sculpture.

Governors Hall is the companion building to Newman Hall. The residence halls are located on Rankin Drive south of the Recreation and Fitness Center construction site.


