USI BOARD APPROVES BACHELOR OF SOCIAL WORK PROGRAM. The USI Board of Trustees approved a Bachelor of Social Work degree program at its regular meeting on Friday, January 10. The program still must be approved by the Indiana Commission for Higher Education before it can be offered at USI. Plans call for implementation in the fall of 1986.
