H. Ray Hoops to be inaugurated as USI's second president


The inauguration of Dr. H. Ray Hoops on Friday, March 17, as the second president of the University of Southern Indiana will mark the first presidential inauguration for the University.

USI's first president, Dr. David L. Rice, headed the campus with the title dean of campus for four years until 1971, when he was appointed president by the Indiana State University Board of Trustees. In 1985 when the campus gained separate state university status, Dr. Rice became president of the University of Southern Indiana with no formal ceremony.

More than 60 delegates representing public and private institutions of higher education in Indiana and the nation are expected to assemble for two days of planned activities, which will include:

- A reception honoring Dr. and Mrs. Hoops on Thursday, March 16, at the Evansville Country Club, hosted by the USI Board of Trustees; invited guests will be major donors to the University and friends of the Hoops family.

- A private Mass in the University Home on Friday morning, March 17, celebrated by Bishop Gerald Gettelfinger of the Evansville Diocese and hosted by the USI Campus Ministry Board; Hoops family members and personal friends will attend.

- An inaugural convocation at 10 a.m. March 17 in Mitchell Auditorium in the Health Professions Center, featuring Mr. Willie Morris, author, former educator, former editor of Harper's magazine, and a former colleague of Dr. Hoops at the University of Mississippi. A book signing will follow.

- A noon luncheon on March 17 in the University Center, where members of the USI Alumni Association will welcome visiting delegates from other universities.

- The investiture ceremony at 3 p.m. March 17 in the Vanderburgh Auditorium in downtown Evansville; a public reception will follow in the adjacent Gold Room.

Dr. Frank Stanonis, chair of the Geology/Physics Department, will lead the academic procession as grand marshal. He will carry the University mace which incorporates a replica of an 1877 walnut walking cane donated to the University by Mr. Kenneth Dale Owen, great-grandson of Richard Owen. Richard Owen was the first president of Purdue University and was the son of Robert Owen, Welsh-born industrialist who founded a second communal society in New Harmony, Indiana, which he had bought

Author Willie Morris to speak at convocation

A special convocation on Friday, March 17, celebrating the inauguration of Dr. H. Ray Hoops as second president of the 30-year-old University of Southern Indiana will feature a former colleague of Dr. Hoops at the University of Mississippi in Oxford.

Mr. Willie Morris, author and former editor and educator, will speak at 10 a.m. in Mitchell Auditorium of the Health Professions Center on the topic, "The Mississippi Delta: The Most Southern Place on Earth." A book signing will follow. The program is open to the University community and the public.

Morris is the author of 14 books, including two autobiographies, *North Toward Home* (1967) and its sequel, *New York Days* (1993), which give literary detail to his migration from Mississippi to New York City, where he was editor of *Harper's* magazine (1967-71). He was writer-in-residence at Ole Miss for a decade (1980-90).

The USI Bookstore hopes to have four of Willie Morris's books available during his visit -- his two autobiographies, *A Prayer for the Opening of Little League Season*, and *The Last of the Southern Girls*, published in 1973 and reprinted in 1994

Names in the news:

Dr. Darrel E. Bigham, professor of history and director of Historic Southern Indiana Project, chaired a session at the February 24-25 annual meeting of the Indiana Association of Historians at Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology. The panel discussed the nature of the controversy surrounding National History Standards and the prospect of implementing them in Indiana.

During his sabbatical this semester, Dr. Bigham is working on a book for the Ohio River Series of University Press of Kentucky. He is studying how and why settlement occurred in the Lower Ohio Valley (between Louisville and Cairo, Illinois) from 1792 to 1920. USI basketball

The USI men's team finished the season 23-4, with their 15-3 record in the Great Lakes Valley Conference (GLVC) just one game out of the first place held by Northern Kentucky, 24-3, and Kentucky Wesleyan, 23-4. The two Kentucky teams had tied for the GLVC lead with 16-2 conference records. NKU won the automatic bid under NCAA tie-breaker rules and will host the regional at Riverfront Coliseum, Cincinnati, Saturday and Sunday, March 11-12.

In the first round of play, USI met Hillsdale on Wednesday, March 8, at the PAC, with the winner to face Kentucky Wesleyan Saturday in Cincinnati.

The Lady Eagles, making their first foray into NCAA regional play, will face Oakland University of Michigan in competition at Michigan Tech at Houghton, on the Upper Peninsula, at 7 p.m. Friday, March 10. They finished the season 22-4 and are No. 2 seed in the regional.

The two USI teams go into play as GLVC award winners, as picked this week by GLVC coaches. Sophomore LeAnn Freeland was named Player of the Year and picked for the all-GLVC first team in women's competition. Freshman Eileen Weber was named Newcomer of the Year. Junior Deb Pope received honorable mention.

In men's basketball, junior Stan Gouard was named all-GLVC first team for the second year. Senior Cortez Barnes, a transfer from the University of Tennessee, was picked as Newcomer of the Year. Barnes, senior Brian Huebner, and junior Chad Gilbert received honorable mention.
